**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:** Requires Superintendent of Public Instruction to issue fact-finding report on division of South Umpqua School District No. 19 on or before October 31, 2007. Provides for selection and duties of designated fact-finder. Requires report to order district boundary board to submit question of dividing school district to school district electors, recommend conversion of new school to public charter school, or recommend alternative operation of new school. Requires district boundary board to proceed with division if majority of votes cast in election approve. Provides for appointment of initial board of directors of new district. Requires contributions for costs of administering statute. Declares an emergency; effective upon passage.

## EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Replaces the measure.

**BACKGROUND:** Current law does not allow school districts to divide. This bill stems from the South Umpqua school district closure of the middle school in Canyonville last spring. The closure was opposed by some residents. Since the closure, some Canyonville sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students have been transported to Coffenberry Middle School in Myrtle Creek while other students chose to go to the Days Creek Charter School.
