## EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

**BACKGROUND:** Carl F. Flipper III, an activist in North Portland, passed away on November 24, 2006. He was involved in numerous community organizations and served as president of the Buffalo Soldiers Historical Society, president of the Oregon Enterprise Forum, and president of the Portland chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Flipper's alma mater, Sangamon State University, is now the University of Illinois at Springfield.

Flipper's grand-uncle was Henry Ossian Flipper, who had been born into slavery on March 21, 1856 in Thomasville, Georgia, and, in 1877, became the first African-American graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point. Henry O. Flipper wrote a book about his experiences, *The Colored Cadet at West Point*.
