# House Bill 2904

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Provides that offenders sentenced to mandatory minimum terms of imprisonment for certain crimes committed when they were 15, 16 or 17 years of age are eligible for conditional release under certain circumstances.

#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to sentencing; creating new provisions; amending ORS 137.707, 420A.203 and 420A.206; and

3 providing for criminal sentence reduction that requires approval by a two-thirds majority.

## 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

**SECTION 1.** ORS 137.707 is amended to read:

6 137.707. (1)(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, when a person charged with aggra-7 vated murder, as defined in ORS 163.095, or an offense listed in subsection (4)(a) of this section is 8 15, 16 or 17 years of age at the time the offense is committed, and the offense is committed on or 9 after April 1, 1995, or when a person charged with an offense listed in subsection (4)(b) of this sec-10 tion is 15, 16 or 17 years of age at the time the offense is committed, and the offense is committed 11 on or after October 4, 1997, the person shall be prosecuted as an adult in criminal court.

(b) A district attorney, the Attorney General or a juvenile department counselor may not file in juvenile court a petition alleging that a person has committed an act that, if committed by an adult, would constitute aggravated murder or an offense listed in subsection (4) of this section if the person was 15, 16 or 17 years of age at the time the act was committed.

16 (2)(a) When a person charged under this section is convicted of an offense listed in subsection 17(4) of this section, the court shall impose at least the presumptive term of imprisonment provided for the offense in subsection (4) of this section. The court may impose a greater presumptive term if 18 19 otherwise permitted by law, but may not impose a lesser term. [The person is not, during the service 20 of the term of imprisonment, eligible for release on post-prison supervision or any form of temporary 21leave from custody. The person is not eligible for any reduction in, or based on, the minimum sentence 22for any reason under ORS 421.121 or any other provision of law.] ORS 138.012, 163.105 and 163.150 23apply to sentencing a person prosecuted under this section and convicted of aggravated murder under ORS 163.095 except that a person who was under 18 years of age at the time the offense was 24committed is not subject to a sentence of death. 25

(b) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 420A.203, a person sentenced under this sub section is not:

(A) During the service of the term of imprisonment, eligible for release on post-prison
 supervision or any form of temporary leave from custody; or

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(B) Eligible for any reduction in the minimum sentence for any reason.

420A.203. (1)(a) This section and ORS 420A.206 apply only to persons who were under 18 years 32of age at the time of the commission of the offense for which the persons were sentenced to a term 33 34 of imprisonment, who committed the offense on or after June 30, 1995, and who were sentenced to 35 a term of imprisonment:

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(A) [Sentenced to a term of imprisonment] Of at least 24 months following waiver under ORS 419C.349, 419C.352, 419C.364 or 419C.370; [or] 37

38 (B) [Sentenced to a term of imprisonment] Of at least 24 months under ORS 137.707 (5)(b)(A) or (7)(b); or 39

permit witnesses to appear by telephone or other two-way electronic communication device.

The Department of Corrections shall submit the release plan no 10 later than 45 days after completion of the hearing. The Department of Corrections shall incorporate 11 12 any conditions recommended by the court and shall consider any recommendations made by the 13 Oregon Youth Authority. 12 (3)(a) A person conditionally released under this section remains within the jurisdiction of the 13 sentencing court for the period of the conditional release.

(b) At any time after the entry of an order of conditional release, the court, on its own motion 14 15 or on motion of the Department of Corrections, may amend the conditional release order to modify 16 the conditions of the person's release and supervision, providing that the modifications are consistent with the requirements for conditions of release in subsections (1) and (2) of this section. Before 17 18 entering an amended order under this paragraph, the court shall provide the Department of Cor-19 rections and the person with a reasonable amount of time to comment on the proposed modifications. 20The court shall serve the Department of Corrections and the person with a copy of the amended 21order at least 15 days before the order takes effect.

(c) The Department of Corrections and the supervisory authority may adjust the level of the person's supervision as is appropriate to the person's progress and conduct in the community.

(4)(a) If an officer of the Department of Corrections or the supervisory authority or a law enforcement officer has reasonable grounds to believe that a person released under this section has violated a condition of the release, the officer may take the person into custody and detain the person pending a hearing on the alleged violation as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection. No later than 24 hours after a person is taken into custody under this subsection, the Department of Corrections or the supervisory authority shall file a notice and affidavit with the court as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection and serve a copy of the notice and affidavit on the person.

(b) When a notice and affidavit is filed under paragraph (a) of this subsection and if the court finds that the notice and affidavit state reasonable grounds to believe the person has violated a condition of the release, the court shall issue an order that the person appear and show cause why the conditional release should not be revoked or suspended as a sanction for the alleged violation. When a court issues an order under this paragraph, the court shall:

(A) Serve a copy of the order to show cause on the person and the district attorney; and

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(i) The time, place and purpose of the hearing;

(ii) That the person has the right to have adverse witnesses present at the hearing for purpose
of confrontation and cross-examination unless the court determines that good cause exists for not
permitting confrontation;

(B) Provide the person with written notice containing the following information:

(iii) That the person has the right to subpoena witnesses and present documentary evidence and
 testimony of witnesses;

(iv) That the person has the right to be represented by counsel and, if financially eligible, to
have counsel appointed at state expense as provided in paragraph (d) of this subsection; and

(v) The possible sanction authorized if the court determines that the person has violated the 1 2 conditions of release.

(c) The court shall hold the hearing no more than 15 days after issuing the order to appear and 3 show cause. The court may order the person to be detained pending the hearing and disposition. 4

(d) In a hearing under this subsection: 5

(A) The person has the right to be represented by counsel and, if financially eligible, to have 6 counsel appointed at state expense if the court determines, after request, that the request is based 7 on a timely and colorable claim that: 8

(i) The person has not committed the alleged violation of the release conditions;

(ii) Even if the violation is a matter of public record or is uncontested, there are substantial 10 reasons that justify or mitigate the violation and make revocation inappropriate and the reasons are 11 12 complex or otherwise difficult to develop or present; or

13 (iii) The person, in doubtful cases, appears to be incapable of speaking effectively on the person's own behalf; 14

15 (B) The Department of Corrections or the supervisory authority has the burden of proving the alleged violation by a preponderance of the evidence; 16

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(C) The state is a party and is represented by the district attorney;

18 (D) The standards for the introduction and admissibility of evidence in contested case hearings under ORS 183.450 (1) and (2) apply in the hearing; 19

(E) If the court finds that the person has violated the conditions of release and that subsection 20(5) of this section does not apply, the person has the burden of establishing good cause why the 2122conditional release should not be revoked or suspended; and

23(F) At the conclusion of the hearing, the court shall enter an order containing findings of fact and, if the court finds that the person violated a condition of release, stating what sanctions are 24imposed. 25

(e) Except as provided in subsection (5) of this section, when the court finds that the person has 2627violated a condition of release, the court shall impose one or more of the following sanctions:

(A) Adjustments to the level of supervision; 28

(B) Modifications of the conditions of release; 29

30 (C) Any appropriate available local sanctions including, but not limited to, community service 31 work, house arrest, electronic surveillance, restitution centers, work release centers or day centers; 32

(D) Suspension of conditional release for up to 180 days; or

(E) Revocation of conditional release. 33

34 (5) At the conclusion of the hearing, the court shall revoke the person's conditional release and 35 order the person committed to the physical custody of the Department of Corrections to be confined for the entire remainder of the sentence of imprisonment imposed, taking into account any reduction 36 37 in the sentence under ORS 421.121 or any other statute for which the person is eligible, if the 38 court finds that:

(a) The person has been convicted of a new criminal offense;

(b) The person has violated the condition prohibiting ownership, possession or control of a 40 dangerous weapon or deadly weapon, as those terms are defined in ORS 161.015, or a dangerous 41 animal; or 42

(c) The person's conditional release has been suspended twice under this section within the past 43 18 months. 44

(6)(a) The state, the Department of Corrections or the person may appeal from an order of con-45

1 ditional release under this section. The appellate court's review is limited to claims that the court

2 failed to comply with the requirements of law in ordering the conditional release.

3 (b) The state, the Department of Corrections or the person may appeal from an order of the 4 court entered under subsection (4) or (5) of this section. The appellate court's review is limited to 5 claims that:

6 (A) The disposition is not authorized under this section;

7 (B) The court failed to comply with the requirements of law; and

8 (C) The finding of the court that the person did or did not violate a condition of release is not 9 supported by substantial evidence in the record.

10 SECTION 4. The amendments to ORS 137.707, 420A.203 and 420A.206 by sections 1 to 3

of this 2007 Act apply to persons sentenced for offenses committed on or after the effective
 date of this 2007 Act.

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
