House Bill 3350

Sponsored by Representative LIM (at the request of Seth Hatmaker)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Directs governing boards of post-secondary institutions to adopt rule on academic freedom and rights of faculty, instructors and students. Directs governing boards to adopt grievance procedure for faculty, instructors and students.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2007.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to higher education; and declaring an emergency.

3 Whereas academic freedom and intellectual diversity are values indispensable to American col-

4 leges and universities; and

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5 Whereas from its first formulation in the General Report of the Committee on Academic Free-

6 dom and Tenure of the American Association of University Professors, the concept of academic

7 freedom has been premised on the idea that human knowledge is a never-ending pursuit of the truth,

8 that there is no humanly accessible truth that is not, in principle, open to challenge and that no

9 party or intellectual faction has a monopoly on wisdom; and

10 Whereas academic freedom is likely to thrive in an environment of intellectual diversity that 11 protects and fosters independence of thought and speech; and

12 Whereas students and faculty should be protected from the imposition of ideological orthodoxy, 13 and faculty members have the responsibility to not take advantage of their positions of authority to 14 introduce inappropriate or irrelevant subject matter outside their fields of study; now, therefore,

15 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

16 <u>SECTION 1.</u> As used in sections 2 and 3 of this 2007 Act, "post-secondary institution" 17 means:

18 (1) A community college;

19 (2) A state institution of higher education listed in ORS 352.002;

20 (3) The Oregon Health and Science University; and

(4) A school that has been authorized to offer academic degrees under ORS 348.594 to
 348.615.

23 <u>SECTION 2.</u> The governing board of each post-secondary institution shall adopt a rule 24 recognizing that the students, faculty and instructors of the institution have the following 25 rights:

(1) The institution shall provide its students with a learning environment in which the
students have access to a broad range of serious scholarly opinion pertaining to the subjects
they study. In the humanities, the social sciences and the arts, the fostering of a plurality
of serious scholarly methodologies and perspectives shall be a significant institutional purpose. In addition, curricula and reading lists in the humanities and social studies shall re-

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spect all human knowledge in these areas and provide students with dissenting sources and
 viewpoints.

3 (2) Students shall be graded solely on the basis of their reasoned answers on, and ap-4 propriate knowledge of, the subjects and disciplines the students study and may not be dis-5 criminated against on the basis of their political, ideological or religious beliefs. Faculty and 6 instructors may not use their courses or their positions for the purpose of political, ideo-7 logical, religious or antireligious indoctrination.

8 (3) Faculty and instructors may not infringe upon the academic freedom and quality of 9 education of their students by persistently introducing controversial matter into the class-10 room or coursework that has no relation to the students' subjects of study and that serves 11 no legitimate pedagogical purpose.

(4) Institution administrators, student government organizations and institutional poli cies, rules or procedures may not infringe upon the freedom of speech, freedom of ex pression, freedom of assembly or freedom of conscience of students and student
 organizations.

16(5) The institution shall distribute funds for student activities on a viewpoint-neutral basis and shall maintain a posture of neutrality with respect to substantive political and re-17 18 ligious disagreements, differences and opinions. The selection of speakers, allocation of funds for speakers' programs and other student activities shall observe the principles of academic 19 20freedom and shall promote the presentation of a diversity of opinions on intellectual matters. Except as provided by law, the institution may not permit the obstruction of invited campus 2122speakers, the destruction of campus literature or other efforts to obstruct a civil exchange 23of ideas.

(6) Faculty and instructors shall be free to pursue and discuss their own findings and perspectives in presenting their views, but they shall make their students aware of serious scholarly viewpoints other than their own through classroom discussion or dissemination of written materials. Faculty and instructors shall encourage in their students intellectual honesty, civil debate and the critical analysis of ideas in the pursuit of knowledge and truth.

(7) Faculty and instructors shall be hired, fired, promoted and granted tenure on the
 basis of their competence and appropriate knowledge in their field of expertise and may not
 be hired, fired, promoted, granted tenure or denied promotion or tenure on the basis of their
 political, ideological or religious beliefs.

(8) Faculty and instructors may not be excluded from tenure or search and hiring com mittees on the basis of their political, ideological or religious beliefs.

(9) The institution and its professional societies shall maintain a posture of organiza tional neutrality with respect to the substantive disagreements that divide researchers on
 questions within, or outside, their fields of study, recognizing that:

(a) Knowledge advances when individual scholars are left free to reach their own con clusions about which methods, facts and theories have been validated by research; and

(b) Academic institutions and professional societies formed to advance knowledge within
an area of research, maintain the integrity of the research process and organize the professional lives of related researchers serve as indispensable venues within which scholars circulate research findings and debate their interpretations.

44 <u>SECTION 3.</u> The governing board of each post-secondary institution shall adopt, by rule, 45 a grievance procedure by which a student, faculty member or instructor may seek redress

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1 for an alleged violation of any of the rights specified by the institution's policy adopted under

2 section 2 of this 2007 Act. Each board shall provide students, faculty and instructors with

3 notice of the rights and grievance procedure by publication in the institution's course catalog

4 and student handbook and on the institution's website.

5 SECTION 4. Sections 1 to 3 of this 2007 Act first apply to the 2007-2008 academic year.

6 <u>SECTION 5.</u> This 2007 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 7 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2007 Act takes effect 8 July 1, 2007.

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
