# Senate Bill 1020

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Repeals laws prohibiting person from engaging in both wholesale and retail sales of alcoholic beverages.

ORS 471.392, 471.394, 471.396, 471.398, 471.400, 471.401, 471.402, 471.485, 471.490, 8 471.495 and 471.500 are repealed. 9 SECTION 2. ORS 166.715 is amended to read: 166.715. As used in ORS 166.715 to 166.735, unless the context requires otherwise: 10 (1) "Documentary material" means any book, paper, document, writing, drawing, graph, chart, 11 photograph, phonograph record, magnetic tape, computer printout, other data compilation from 12 13which information can be obtained or from which information can be translated into usable form, or other tangible item. 14 (2) "Enterprise" includes any individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, business 15trust or other profit or nonprofit legal entity, and includes any union, association or group of indi-16 17 viduals associated in fact although not a legal entity, and both illicit and licit enterprises and governmental and nongovernmental entities. 18 19 (3) "Investigative agency" means the Department of Justice or any district attorney. (4) "Pattern of racketeering activity" means engaging in at least two incidents of racketeering 20 21activity that have the same or similar intents, results, accomplices, victims or methods of commis-22sion or otherwise are interrelated by distinguishing characteristics, including a nexus to the same enterprise, and are not isolated incidents, provided at least one of such incidents occurred after 2324 November 1, 1981, and that the last of such incidents occurred within five years after a prior inci-25dent of racketeering activity. Notwithstanding ORS 131.505 to 131.525 or 419A.190 or any other 26 provision of law providing that a previous prosecution is a bar to a subsequent prosecution, conduct 27that constitutes an incident of racketeering activity may be used to establish a pattern of 28 racketeering activity without regard to whether the conduct previously has been the subject of a criminal prosecution or conviction or a juvenile court adjudication, unless the prosecution resulted 29in an acquittal or the adjudication resulted in entry of an order finding the youth not to be within 30 the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. 31

(5) "Person" means any individual or entity capable of holding a legal or beneficial interest in 1 2 real or personal property. | 45       | <b>SECTION 3.</b> ORS 471.038 is amended to read:  |

471.038. (1) Nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section may be sold 1 2 at retail by any holder of a license issued by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission that authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor at retail, or in any store operated by the commission under the pro-3 visions of ORS 471.750. Any nonbeverage food product containing more than one-half of one percent 4 of alcohol by volume must be clearly labeled to reflect the alcohol content of the product and clearly 5 labeled on the front of the package to indicate that the product may not be sold to persons under 6 7 21 years of age.

8 (2) Except as provided by this section, sales of nonbeverage food products described in sub-9 section (6) of this section are subject to all provisions of this chapter, including the prohibitions on 10 sales to persons under 21 years of age and the prohibitions on sales to persons who are visibly intoxicated. 11

12(3) Nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section may be imported, 13 stored and distributed in this state without a license issued by the commission. Nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section are not subject to the privilege taxes imposed 14 15 by ORS chapter 473.

16 (4) [Manufacturers of nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section are not subject to the provisions of ORS 471.392 to 471.400, 471.485, 471.490 or 471.495 or any other provision 17 18 of this chapter relating to manufacturers of alcoholic liquor.] A manufacturer of nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section may sell and deliver the product directly to a 19 20 licensee authorized under this section to sell the product at retail.

(5) The holder of a distillery license issued under ORS 471.230 who is also a manufacturer of 2122nonbeverage food products described in subsection (6) of this section may purchase distilled liquor 23directly from other distilleries.

(6) The provisions of this section apply only to nonbeverage food products that contain not more 24 25than five percent alcohol by weight or 10 percent alcohol by volume, whichever is greater.

SECTION 4. ORS 471.200 is amended to read: 26

27471.200. (1) A brewery-public house license allows the licensee:

(a) To manufacture on the licensed premises, store, transport, sell to wholesale malt beverage 28and wine licensees of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission and export malt beverages; 29

30 (b) To sell malt beverages manufactured on or off the licensed premises at retail for consumption 31 on or off the premises;

32(c) To sell malt beverages in brewery-sealed packages at retail directly to the consumer for consumption off the premises; 33

34 (d) To sell on the licensed premises at retail malt beverages manufactured on or off the licensed 35premises in unpasteurized or pasteurized form directly to the consumer for consumption off the premises, delivery of which may be made in a securely covered container supplied by the consumer; 36 37

(e) To sell wine and cider at retail for consumption on or off the premises; and

38 (f) To conduct the activities described in paragraphs (b) to (e) of this subsection at one location other than the premises where the manufacturing occurs. 39

[(2) In addition to the privileges specified in subsection (1) of this section, in any calendar year a 40 brewery-public house licensee may sell at wholesale to licensees of the commission malt beverages 41 produced by the brewery-public house licensee if the brewery-public house licensee produced 1,000 42 barrels or less of malt beverages in the immediately preceding calendar year.] 43

[(3) A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, is a retail 44 licensee for the purposes of ORS 471.394 and, except as otherwise provided by this section and ORS 45

471.396, may not acquire or hold any right, title, lien, claim or other interest, financial or otherwise, in, upon or to the premises, equipment, business or merchandise of any manufacturer or wholesaler, as defined in ORS 471.392. A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, is also a manufacturer for the purposes of ORS 471.398 and, except as otherwise provided by this section and ORS 471.400, may not acquire or hold any right, title, lien, claim or other interest, financial or otherwise, in, upon or to the premises, equipment, business or merchandise of any other retail licensee, as defined in ORS 471.392.]

[(4) A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, is a retail 8 9 licensee for the purposes of ORS 471.398 and, except as otherwise provided by this section and ORS 471.400, may not accept directly or indirectly any financial assistance described in ORS 471.398 from 10 any manufacturer or wholesaler, as defined in ORS 471.392. A brewery-public house licensee, or any 11 12 person having an interest in the licensee, is also a manufacturer for the purposes of ORS 471.398 and, except as otherwise provided by this section and ORS 471.400, may not provide directly or indirectly 13 any financial assistance described in ORS 471.398 to any retail licensee, as defined in ORS 471.392. 14 The prohibitions on financial assistance in ORS 471.398 do not apply to financial assistance between 15 16 manufacturing and retail businesses licensed to the same person under the provisions of this section.]

[(5) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee, or any person
having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a winery license authorized by ORS 471.223. A
brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a warehouse license authorized by ORS 471.242.]

21 [(6) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee is eligible for 22 limited on-premises sales licenses and temporary sales licenses.]

[(7)(a) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, and except as provided in this subsection, a brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a full on-premises sales license. If a person holds both a brewery-public house license and a full on-premises sales license, nothing in this chapter shall prevent the sale by the licensee of both distilled liquor and malt beverages manufactured under the brewery-public house license.]

[(b) The commission may not issue a full on-premises sales license to a brewery-public house licensee under the provisions of this subsection if the brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee or exercising control over the licensee, is a brewery that brews more than 200,000 barrels of malt beverages annually or a winery that produces more than 200,000 gallons of wine annually.]

[(c) The commission may not issue a full on-premises sales license to a brewery-public house licensee under the provisions of this subsection if the brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee or exercising control over the licensee, is a distillery, unless the distillery produces only pot distilled liquor and produces no more than 12,000 gallons of pot distilled liquor annually.]

[(8) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a distillery license if the licensee produces only pot distilled liquor, and produces no more than 12,000 gallons of pot distilled liquor annually. No provision of this chapter prevents a brewery-public house licensee from becoming a retail sales agent of the commission for the purpose of selling distilled liquors.]

13 471.227. (1) A grower sales privilege license shall allow the licensee to perform the following 14 activities only for fruit or grape wine or cider where all of the fruit or grapes used to make the 15 wine or cider are grown in Oregon under the control of the licensee:

16 (a) To import, store, transport or export such wines or cider.

(b) To sell such wines or cider at wholesale to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission orlicensees of the commission.

(c) To sell such wines or cider at retail directly to the consumer for consumption on or off thelicensed premises.

(d) To conduct the activities allowed under paragraph (a), (b) or (c), or all, of this subsectionat a second or third premises as may be designated by the commission.

(e) To obtain a special events grower sales privilege license which shall entitle the holder to
conduct the activities allowed under paragraph (c) of this subsection at a designated location other
than the one set forth in the grower sales privilege license for a period not to exceed five days.

26 [(2) For purposes of ORS 471.392 to 471.400, a grower sales privilege licensee shall be considered 27 a manufacturer.]

[(3)] (2) A person holding a winery license in another state is not eligible for a license underthis section.

32 [(5)] (4) As used in this section, "control" means the grower either owns the land upon which 33 the fruit or grapes are grown or has a legal right to perform or does perform all of the acts common 34 to fruit farming or viticulture under terms of a lease or similar agreement of at least three years' 35 duration.

[(6)] (5) For the purposes of tax reporting, payment and record keeping, the provisions of law

(1) A warehouse license shall allow the licensee to store, import, bottle, produce, blend, 41 transport and export nontax paid, bonded wine or wine on which the tax is paid and to store, import 42 and export nontax paid malt beverages and cider, or malt beverages and cider on which the tax is 43 paid. Wine, cider and malt beverages may be removed from the licensed premises only for:

3 [(5)] (4) That there is a history of serious and persistent problems involving disturbances, lewd or unlawful activities or noise either in the premises proposed to be licensed or involving patrons 4 of the establishment in the immediate vicinity of the premises if the activities in the immediate vi-5 cinity of the premises are related to the sale or service of alcohol under the exercise of the license 6 privilege. Behavior which is grounds for refusal of a license under this section, where so related to 7 the sale or service of alcohol, includes, but is not limited to obtrusive or excessive noise, music or 8 9 sound vibrations; public drunkenness; fights; altercations; harassment; unlawful drug sales; alcohol or related litter; trespassing on private property; and public urination. Histories from premises cur-10 rently or previously operated by the applicant may be considered when reasonable inference may 11 12 be made that similar activities will occur as to the premises proposed to be licensed. 44 [(c)] (b) That there is a history of serious and persistent problems involving disturbances, lewd 45 or unlawful activities or noise either in the premises or involving patrons of the establishment in

the immediate vicinity of the premises if the activities in the immediate vicinity of the premises are 1 2 related to the sale or service of alcohol under the exercise of the license privilege. Behavior which is grounds for cancellation or suspension of a license under this section, where so related to the sale 3 or service of alcohol, includes, but is not limited to obtrusive or excessive noise, music or sound 4 vibrations; public drunkenness; fights; altercations; harassment or unlawful drug sales; alcohol or  $\mathbf{5}$ related litter; trespassing on private property; and public urination. 31 [(5)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a winery licensee, or any person 32 having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a full on-premises sales license.
