## **A-Engrossed** Senate Bill 331

Ordered by the Senate April 19 Including Senate Amendments dated April 19

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## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Creates crime of organized retail theft. Punishes by maximum of 10 years' imprisonment, \$250,000 fine, or both. Adds offense to provisions relating to racketeering activity.

3	Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
4	SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2007 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 164.
5	SECTION 2. (1) A person commits the crime of organized retail theft if, acting in concert
6	with another person:
7	(a) The person violates ORS 164.015 or aids or abets the other person to violate ORS
8	164.015;
9	(b) The subject of the theft is merchandise and the merchandise is taken from a
10	mercantile establishment; and
11	(c) The aggregate value of the merchandise taken within any 90-day period exceeds \$5,000.
12	(2) As used in this section:
13	(a) "Merchandise" has the meaning given that term in ORS 30.870.
14	(b) "Mercantile establishment" has the meaning given that term in ORS 30.870.
15	(3) Organized retail theft is a Class B felony.
16	SECTION 3. ORS 166.715 is amended to read:
17	166.715. As used in ORS 166.715 to 166.735, unless the context requires otherwise:
18	(1) "Documentary material" means any book, paper, document, writing, drawing, graph, chart,
19	photograph, phonograph record, magnetic tape, computer printout, other data compilation from
20	which information can be obtained or from which information can be translated into usable form,
21	or other tangible item.
22	(2) "Enterprise" includes any individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, business
23	trust or other profit or nonprofit legal entity, and includes any union, association or group of indi-
24	viduals associated in fact although not a legal entity, and both illicit and licit enterprises and gov-
25	ernmental and nongovernmental entities.
26	(3) "Investigative agency" means the Department of Justice or any district attorney.
27	(4) "Pattern of racketeering activity" means engaging in at least two incidents of racketeering

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activity that have the same or similar intents, results, accomplices, victims or methods of commis-1 sion or otherwise are interrelated by distinguishing characteristics, including a nexus to the same 2 enterprise, and are not isolated incidents, provided at least one of such incidents occurred after 3 November 1, 1981, and that the last of such incidents occurred within five years after a prior inci-4 dent of racketeering activity. Notwithstanding ORS 131.505 to 131.525 or 419A.190 or any other 5 provision of law providing that a previous prosecution is a bar to a subsequent prosecution, conduct 6 that constitutes an incident of racketeering activity may be used to establish a pattern of 7 racketeering activity without regard to whether the conduct previously has been the subject of a 8 9 criminal prosecution or conviction or a juvenile court adjudication, unless the prosecution resulted in an acquittal or the adjudication resulted in entry of an order finding the youth not to be within 10 the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. 11 12 (5) "Person" means any individual or entity capable of holding a legal or beneficial interest in 13 real or personal property. 45 or contracted:

1 (a) In violation of any one of the following:

2 (A) ORS chapter 462, relating to racing;

3 (B) ORS 167.108 to 167.164, relating to gambling; or

4 (C) ORS 82.010 to 82.170, relating to interest and usury.

5 (b) In gambling activity in violation of federal law or in the business of lending money at a rate 6 usurious under federal or state law.

7 (8) Notwithstanding contrary provisions in ORS 174.060, when this section references a statute

8 in the Oregon Revised Statutes that is substantially different in the nature of its essential provisions

9 from what the statute was when this section was enacted, the reference shall extend to and include

10 amendments to the statute.

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
