## Senate Bill 823

Sponsored by Senator AVAKIAN; Senator ATKINSON, Representative BONAMICI

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Authorizes State Historic Preservation Officer to restrict or condition development along route of Oregon Trail. Requires public body that receives application for development to submit application to officer for review.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to development along Oregon Trail; and declaring an emergency.

**3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:** 

4 <u>SECTION 1.</u> The Legislative Assembly finds and declares that:

5 (1) The Oregon Trail deserves protection and preservation as a finite, irreplaceable and

nonrenewable historic and cultural resource and an intrinsic part of the historic and cultural
heritage of the people of Oregon and the United States.

8 (2) The historic and cultural importance of the Oregon Trail is a matter of statewide

9 concern, and sections 1 to 3 of this 2007 Act apply to the approval or denial of an application

10 for a permit or other development approval under state law, charter provisions, ordinances

11 or rules regulating the issuance of permits or other development approvals for a change in

12 the use of land within 660 feet of the route of the Oregon Trail.

13 SECTION 2. As used in sections 1 to 3 of this 2007 Act:

(1) "Oregon Trail" means a pathway for early emigrants to the state of Oregon and a
practical corridor to the western United States as identified on the 1959 Oregon State Highway Department map of the Oregon Trail in 10 sections, identified as "T. E. D. Draw'g No.
6138" and on file with the State Historic Preservation Officer.

18 (2) "Public body" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.109.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> (1) The State Historic Preservation Officer shall protect and preserve the
 Oregon Trail in Oregon as a public trust for the benefit of the residents of the State of
 Oregon.

(2) If a public body receives an application for a permit under ORS 215.402 to 215.438 or
23 227.160 to 227.186 or an application for any other development approval to change a present
24 use, including construction or remodeling of structures at a location within 660 feet of the
25 route of the Oregon Trail, the public body shall refer the application to the State Historic
26 Preservation Officer for review of the potential impacts to the Oregon Trail before making
27 a decision on the application.

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(3) The State Historic Preservation Officer may:

(a) Restrict or condition development along the Oregon Trail to protect and preserve the
 Oregon Trail without regard to the presence or absence of visible evidence of the Oregon

1 Trail at the location.

2 (b) Consult with other public bodies.

3 <u>SECTION 4.</u> Sections 1 to 3 of this 2007 Act may be cited as "The Oregon Trail Protection
 4 Act."

5 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Section 6 of this 2007 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 215.402 to 6 215.438.

7 <u>SECTION 6.</u> The time limits for action on an application for a permit under ORS 215.402 8 to 215.438 are tolled during the period that the State Historic Preservation Officer is re-9 viewing the application under section 3 of this 2007 Act.

10 <u>SECTION 7.</u> Section 8 of this 2007 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 227.160 to 11 227.186.

12 <u>SECTION 8.</u> The time limits for action on an application for a permit under ORS 227.160 13 to 227.186 are tolled during the period that the State Historic Preservation Officer is re-

14 viewing the application under section 3 of this 2007 Act.

15 <u>SECTION 9.</u> Sections 1 to 3, 6 and 8 of this 2007 Act apply to an application for a permit 16 or an application for any other development approval filed with a public body on or after the 17 effective date of this 2007 Act.

18 <u>SECTION 10.</u> This 2007 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 19 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2007 Act takes effect 20 on its passage.

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
