WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Allows the Department of Education to make available to school districts and public charter schools an assessment system that uses criterion-referenced assessments, including performance-based assessments and content-based assessments, to do the following: measure a student's progress in achieving academic content standards for the student's grade level; determine the student's grade level of understanding, knowledge and ability, regardless of the student's actual grade level; track and provide reports on the progress of the student; and provide predictions of anticipated progress based on the information acquired and not based on the current grade level of the student. Declares an emergency, effective upon passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: The federal No Child Left Behind Act requires assessments to determine student performance in identified academic areas. ORS 329.485(1)(a) currently requires that the assessment system include criterion-referenced assessments including performance-based assessments, content-based assessments and other valid methods to measure the academic content standards and to identify students that meet or exceed grade-level standards. Under current law, predictive assessments are neither specifically precluded, nor explicitly permitted.
