EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: Currently under ORS 430.640, if there is an emergency situation and no community mental health or developmental disability programs are offered within a county, or when a county is unable to provide a service essential to public health and safety, the Department of Human Services (DHS) has no recourse. HB 2989 would allow DHS to contract directly with human service providers to provide mental health and developmental disabilities programs if programs offered by the county are not satisfactory, and to operate services or programs on a temporary basis if a county is unable to provide a service essential to public health and safety.
