WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Requires public bodies to coordinate with utilities in the planning of highway projects to minimize costs. Excludes property owned by the Port of Portland. Allows utilities to seek and receive reimbursement from private parties or customers. Allows a telecommunications utility not subject to rate-of-return regulation to request Public Utilities Commission (PUC) authorization to recover relocation costs from customers. Prescribes PUC procedures for determining the level of authorized cost recovery.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Adds legislative policy statement. Replaces utility relocation procedures. Requires utility and public body to coordinate the planning of the highway project to minimize costs. Excludes property owned by the Port of Portland. Includes non-utility telecommunications providers. Allows utilities to seek and receive reimbursement from private parties or customers. Allows a telecommunications utility not subject to rate-of-return regulation to request Public Utilities Commission (PUC) authorization to recover relocation costs from customers. Prescribes PUC procedures for determining the level of authorized cost recovery.

BACKGROUND: City, county, state, and interstate road improvement projects often require the identification and relocation of utilities. Coordination of these utility relocations among public agencies, utility owners and construction contractors has been a growing concern. Lack of effective coordination may result in incomplete construction plans, construction delays, and additional costs.
