EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: It is currently against the law if a person knowingly attends a cockfight or pays admission at any location to view or bet on a cockfight, or sells equipment with the intent that the equipment be used in training or handling a fighting bird. SB 280 would increase the penalty for participating in a cockfight from a Class A misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of one year imprisonment and a \$6,250 fine, to a Class C felony with a maximum penalty of five years' imprisonment and a \$125,000 fine.
