EFFECTIVE DATE: January 1, 2010

GOVERNOR'S BUDGET: This bill is not anticipated by the Governor's recommended budget.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT MANDATE: This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

ANALYSIS: This bill requires counties, in cooperation with the Department of Corrections (DOC), to supervise persons convicted of a misdemeanor and on probation who request to leave Oregon or are moving to Oregon from another state.

The Interstate Compact for Adult Offender Supervision is an organization of all 50 states set up to regulate the interstate supervision of individuals on parole or probation. The interstate compact is administered by the Interstate Commission that is made up of representatives from the participating states. Under current practice misdemeanor offenders are not supervised by community corrections. Now misdemeanor offenders transferring into Oregon will need to be supervised.

DOC makes grants to community corrections organizations (generally counties) for the supervision of offenders. The grants are based upon the risk assessment of the offender. This bill will have a general fund impact due to the increase in the number of individuals subject to post prison supervision.
