# A-Engrossed House Bill 2335

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Prohibits State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision from considering release of certain prisoners on parole less than five years from previous denial of release or postponement of release date. Authorizes reduction of five-year period under certain circumstances.] Prohibits State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, after board denies petition

Prohibits State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, after board denies petition for change in terms of confinement of prisoner convicted of aggravated murder or murder, from granting prisoner subsequent hearing that is less than two years, or more than 10 years, from date petition is denied. Specifies procedures for granting hearing after period of two years and issuing final order on hearing.

Prohibits board from considering release of certain prisoners on parole less than two years, or more than 10 years, from date on which parole is denied. Specifies procedures for granting hearing after period of two years and issuing final order on hearing.

9 (b) The board may not grant the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from 10 the date a petition is denied unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to expect that 11 the prisoner would be granted a change in the terms of confinement before the date of the 12 subsequent hearing.

(c) The board shall determine the date of the subsequent hearing in accordance with
 rules adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this paragraph must be based on the foun dation principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.

16 (2) If the board grants the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date 17 a petition is denied, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim hearing not earlier 18 than the date that is two years from the date the petition is denied and at intervals of not 19 less than two years thereafter. If the board finds, based upon a request for an interim 20 hearing, that there is reasonable cause to believe that the prisoner may be granted a change 21 in the terms of confinement, the board shall conduct a hearing as soon as is reasonably 22 convenient.

(3) When the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the 1 2 date a petition is denied and when the board denies a petition for an interim hearing, the board shall issue a final order. The order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and con-3 clusions of law. The findings of fact shall consist of a concise statement of the underlying 4 facts supporting the findings as to each contested issue of fact and as to each ultimate fact 5 required to support the board's order. Unless the prisoner bears the burden of persuasion, 6 the order shall include findings necessary to deny the prisoner a change in the terms of 7 confinement for any period of time when the prisoner would be presumed to be eligible for 8 9 a change in the terms of confinement.

10 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1)(a) If the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision denies parole 11 to a prisoner sentenced for a crime committed prior to November 1, 1989, the board may not 12 grant the prisoner a subsequent hearing that is less than two years, or more than 10 years, 13 from the date parole is denied, unless the two-year period would exceed the maximum sen-14 tence imposed by the court.

(b) The board may not grant the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date parole is denied unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to expect that the prisoner would be granted parole before the date of the subsequent hearing.

(c) The board shall determine the date of the subsequent hearing pursuant to rules
 adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this paragraph must be based on the foundation
 principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.

(2) If the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date parole is denied, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim hearing not earlier than the date that is two years from the date parole is denied and at intervals of not less than two years thereafter. If the board finds, based upon a request for an interim hearing, that there is reasonable cause to believe that the prisoner may be granted parole, the board shall conduct a hearing as soon as is reasonably convenient.

27(3) When the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date parole is denied and when the board denies a petition for an interim hearing, the board 28shall issue a final order. The order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and conclusions 2930 of law. The findings of fact shall consist of a concise statement of the underlying facts sup-31 porting the findings as to each contested issue of fact and as to each ultimate fact required to support the board's order. Unless the prisoner bears the burden of persuasion, the order 32shall include findings necessary to deny the prisoner parole for any period of time when the 33 34 prisoner would be presumed to be eligible for parole.

SECTION 3. ORS 144.125 is amended to read:

144.125. (1) Prior to the scheduled release of any prisoner on parole and prior to release re-36 37 scheduled under this section, the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may upon re-38 quest of the Department of Corrections or on its own initiative interview the prisoner to review the prisoner's parole plan and psychiatric or psychological report, if any, and the record of the prison-39 er's conduct during confinement. To accommodate such review by the board, the Department of 40 Corrections shall provide to the board any psychiatric or psychological reports held by the depart-41 42ment regarding the prisoner. However, if the psychiatrist or psychologist who prepared any report or any treating psychiatrist or psychologist determines that disclosure to the prisoner of the con-43 tents of the report would be detrimental to the prisoner's mental or emotional health, the psychia-44 trist or psychologist may indorse upon the report a recommendation that it not be disclosed to the 45

1 prisoner. The department may withhold from the board any report so indorsed.

2 (2) The board shall postpone a prisoner's scheduled release date if it finds, after a hearing, that 3 the prisoner engaged in serious misconduct during confinement. The board shall adopt rules defining 4 serious misconduct and specifying periods of postponement for such misconduct.

5 (3)(a) If the board finds the prisoner has a present severe emotional disturbance such as to 6 constitute a danger to the health or safety of the community, the board may order the postponement 7 of the scheduled parole release until a specified future date. The board may not postpone a pris-8 oner's scheduled release date to a date that is less than two years, or more than 10 years, 9 from the date of the hearing, unless the prisoner would be held beyond the maximum sen-10 tence. The board shall determine the scheduled release date, and the prisoner may petition 11 for interim review, in accordance with section 2 of this 2009 Act.

(b) If the board finds the prisoner has a present severe emotional disturbance such as to constitute a danger to the health or safety of the community, but also finds that the prisoner can be adequately controlled with supervision and mental health treatment and that the necessary supervision and treatment are available, the board may order the prisoner released on parole subject to conditions that are in the best interests of community safety and the prisoner's welfare.

(4) Each prisoner shall furnish the board with a parole plan prior to the scheduled release of
the prisoner on parole. The board shall adopt rules specifying the elements of an adequate parole
plan and may defer release of the prisoner for not more than three months if it finds that the parole
plan is inadequate. The Department of Corrections shall assist prisoners in preparing parole plans.

SECTION 4. OKS 144.228 is amended to read:

144.228. (1)(a) Within six months after commitment to the custody of the Department of Corrections of any person sentenced under ORS 161.725 and 161.735 as a dangerous offender, the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision shall set a date for a parole consideration hearing instead of an initial release date as otherwise required under ORS 144.120 and 144.125. The parole consideration hearing date shall be the time the prisoner would otherwise be eligible for parole under the board's rules.

(b)(A) At the parole consideration hearing, the prisoner shall be given a release date in ac-28cordance with the rules of the board if the board finds the prisoner no longer dangerous or finds 2930 that the prisoner remains dangerous but can be adequately controlled with supervision and mental 31 health treatment and that the necessary resources for supervision and treatment are available to the prisoner. If the board is unable to make such findings, [reviews] a review will be conducted [at least 32once every two years] no less than two years, and no more than 10 years, from the date of the 33 34 previous review, until the board is able to make such findings, at which time release on parole shall be ordered if the prisoner is otherwise eligible under the rules. 35

(B) The board may not grant the prisoner a review hearing that is more than two years from the date of the previous hearing unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to expect that the prisoner would be granted a release date before the date of the subsequent hearing.

40 (C) The board shall determine the date of the review hearing in accordance with rules 41 adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this subparagraph must be based on the founda-42 tion principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.

(D) In no event shall the prisoner be held beyond the maximum sentence less good time credits
 imposed by the court.

(c) Nothing in this section [shall preclude] precludes a prisoner from submitting a request for

a parole consideration hearing prior to the earliest time the prisoner is eligible for parole [or a 1 two-year review]. If the board grants a prisoner a review hearing that is more than two years 2 from the date of the previous hearing, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim 3 review hearing not earlier than the date that is two years from the date of the previous 4 hearing and at intervals of not less than two years thereafter. (2) For the parole consideration hearing, the board shall cause to be brought before it andconsider all information regarding such person. The information shall include:

(a) The written report of the examining psychiatrist or psychologist which shall contain all the
facts necessary to assist the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision in making its determination. The report of the examining psychiatrist or psychologist shall be made within two
months of the date of its consideration; and

(b) A written report to be made by the executive officer of the Department of Corrections institution in which the person has been confined. The executive officer's report shall contain:

(A) A detailed account of the person's conduct while confined, all infractions of rules and discipline, all punishment meted out to the person and the circumstances connected therewith, as well as the extent to which the person has responded to the efforts made in the institution to improve the person's mental and moral condition.

30 (B) A statement as to the person's present attitude towards society, towards the sentencing 31 judge, towards the prosecuting district attorney, towards the arresting police officer and towards the 32 person's previous criminal career.

33 (C) The work and program record of the person while in or under the supervision of the De-34 partment of Corrections. The program history shall include a summary of any psychological or sub-35 stance abuse treatment and other activities that will assist the board in understanding the 36 psychological adjustment and social skills and habits of the person and that will assist the board in 37 determining the likelihood for successful community reentry.

SECTION 5. ORS 144.232 is amended to read:

39 144.232. (1) A person sentenced under ORS 161.725 and 161.735 as a dangerous offender for fel-40 onies committed on or after November 1, 1989, shall be considered for release to post-prison super-41 vision. The offender is eligible for release to post-prison supervision after having served the required 42 incarceration term established under ORS 161.737.

(2) The State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision shall hold a release hearing no later
than 10 days prior to the date on which the offender becomes eligible for release on post-prison
supervision as provided in subsection (1) of this section.

1 (3) The dangerous offender's eligibility for and release to post-prison supervision shall be deter-2 mined in a manner consistent with the procedures and criteria required by ORS 144.228 for the 3 parole determination process applicable to dangerous offenders sentenced for crimes committed prior 4 to November 1, 1989.

5 (4) An offender released under this section shall serve the remainder of the sentence term im-6 posed under ORS 161.725, 161.735 and 161.737 on post-prison supervision, however:

7 (a) Notwithstanding ORS 137.010 or the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, the 8 State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may sanction an offender to the supervision of 9 the local authority for a maximum period of 180 days for any supervision violation. 163.105. Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS chapter 144 and ORS 421.450 to 421.490:

(1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 137.700, when a defendant is convicted of aggravated
 murder as defined by ORS 163.095, the defendant shall be sentenced, pursuant to ORS 163.150, to
 death, life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole or life imprisonment.

(b) A person sentenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole under this section shall not have that sentence suspended, deferred or commuted by any judicial officer, and the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may not parole the prisoner nor reduce the period of confinement in any manner whatsoever. The Department of Corrections or any executive official may not permit the prisoner to participate in any sort of release or furlough program.

(c) If sentenced to life imprisonment, the court shall order that the defendant shall be confined

28 (B) Criminal mischief in the first degree by means of an explosive as defined in ORS 164.365;

- 31 (E) Kidnapping in the second degree as defined in ORS 163.225;

(5)(a) A person convicted of murder, who was at least 15 years of age at the time of committing

13 (c) "Pattern or practice" means one or more previous episodes.

(d) "Torture" means to intentionally inflict intense physical pain upon an unwilling victim as aseparate objective apart from any other purpose.

16 <u>SECTION 8.</u> (1) Section 1 of this 2009 Act applies to prisoners convicted of aggravated 17 murder or murder that was committed before, on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act 18 and whose petition for a change in the terms of confinement is denied on or after the effec-19 tive date of this 2009 Act.

(2) Section 2 of this 2009 Act applies to prisoners sentenced for a crime committed prior
to November 1, 1989, and who are denied parole on or after the effective date of this 2009
Act.

(3) The amendments to ORS 144.125, 144.228 and 144.232 by sections 3 to 5 of this 2009
Act apply to prisoners:

(a) Whose release date is postponed under ORS 144.125 on or after the effective date of
 this 2009 Act.

(b) For whom the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision is unable to set a
 release date under ORS 144.228 or 144.232 on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act.
