#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Exempts records and information that identify person as holder of or applicant for concealed handgun license from disclosure. Creates exceptions. Creates procedure by which person may petition to receive copy of public record. Requires application for concealed handgun license to include information relating to exceptions.

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#### 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

**SECTION 1.** ORS 192.502 is amended to read:

6 192.502. The following public records are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

7 (1) Communications within a public body or between public bodies of an advisory nature to the 8 extent that they cover other than purely factual materials and are preliminary to any final agency 9 determination of policy or action. This exemption shall not apply unless the public body shows that 10 in the particular instance the public interest in encouraging frank communication between officials 11 and employees of public bodies clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

(2) Information of a personal nature such as but not limited to that kept in a personal, medical or similar file, if public disclosure would constitute an unreasonable invasion of privacy, unless the public interest by clear and convincing evidence requires disclosure in the particular instance. The party seeking disclosure shall have the burden of showing that public disclosure would not constitute an unreasonable invasion of privacy.

(3) Public body employee or volunteer addresses, Social Security numbers, dates of birth and telephone numbers contained in personnel records maintained by the public body that is the employer or the recipient of volunteer services. This exemption:

(a) Does not apply to the addresses, dates of birth and telephone numbers of employees or volunteers who are elected officials, except that a judge or district attorney subject to election may
seek to exempt the judge's or district attorney's address or telephone number, or both, under the
terms of ORS 192.445;

(b) Does not apply to employees or volunteers to the extent that the party seeking disclosure 1 2 shows by clear and convincing evidence that the public interest requires disclosure in a particular instance; 3 (c) Does not apply to a substitute teacher as defined in ORS 342.815 when requested by a pro-4 fessional education association of which the substitute teacher may be a member; and 5 (d) Does not relieve a public employer of any duty under ORS 243.650 to 243.782. 6 (4) Information submitted to a public body in confidence and not otherwise required by law to 7 be submitted, where such information should reasonably be considered confidential, the public body 8 9 has obliged itself in good faith not to disclose the information, and when the public interest would 10 suffer by the disclosure. (5) Information or records of the Department of Corrections, including the State Board of Parole 11 12 and Post-Prison Supervision, to the extent that disclosure would interfere with the rehabilitation of 13 a person in custody of the department or substantially prejudice or prevent the carrying out of the functions of the department, if the public interest in confidentiality clearly outweighs the public in-14 15 terest in disclosure. 16 (6) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services in the administration of ORS chapters 723 and 725 not 17

otherwise required by law to be made public, to the extent that the interests of lending institutions,
their officers, employees and customers in preserving the confidentiality of such information outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

(7) Reports made to or filed with the court under ORS 137.077 or 137.530.

(8) Any public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited by federal law orregulations.

(9)(a) Public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited or restricted or other wise made confidential or privileged under Oregon law.

(b) Subject to ORS 192.423, paragraph (a) of this subsection does not apply to factual information
 compiled in a public record when:

28 (A) The basis for the claim of exemption is ORS 40.225;

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(B) The factual information is not prohibited from disclosure under any applicable state or federal law, regulation or court order and is not otherwise exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410
to 192.505;

32 (C) The factual information was compiled by or at the direction of an attorney as part of an 33 investigation on behalf of the public body in response to information of possible wrongdoing by the 34 public body;

35 (D) The factual information was not compiled in preparation for litigation, arbitration or an 36 administrative proceeding that was reasonably likely to be initiated or that has been initiated by 37 or against the public body; and

(E) The holder of the privilege under ORS 40.225 has made or authorized a public statement
 characterizing or partially disclosing the factual information compiled by or at the attorney's di rection.

(10) Public records or information described in this section, furnished by the public body originally compiling, preparing or receiving them to any other public officer or public body in connection with performance of the duties of the recipient, if the considerations originally giving rise to the confidential or exempt nature of the public records or information remain applicable.

45 (11) Records of the Energy Facility Siting Council concerning the review or approval of security

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1 programs pursuant to ORS 469.530.

2 (12) Employee and retiree address, telephone number and other nonfinancial membership records

and employee financial records maintained by the Public Employees Retirement System pursuant to
 ORS chapters 238 and 238A.

5 (13) Records of or submitted to the State Treasurer, the Oregon Investment Council or the 6 agents of the treasurer or the council relating to active or proposed publicly traded investments 7 under ORS chapter 293, including but not limited to records regarding the acquisition, exchange or 8 liquidation of the investments. For the purposes of this subsection:

9 (a) The exemption does not apply to:

10 (A) Information in investment records solely related to the amount paid directly into an invest-11 ment by, or returned from the investment directly to, the treasurer or council; or

(B) The identity of the entity to which the amount was paid directly or from which the amountwas received directly.

(b) An investment in a publicly traded investment is no longer active when acquisition, exchangeor liquidation of the investment has been concluded.

(14)(a) Records of or submitted to the State Treasurer, the Oregon Investment Council, the Oregon Growth Account Board or the agents of the treasurer, council or board relating to actual or proposed investments under ORS chapter 293 or 348 in a privately placed investment fund or a private asset including but not limited to records regarding the solicitation, acquisition, deployment, exchange or liquidation of the investments including but not limited to:

(A) Due diligence materials that are proprietary to an investment fund, to an asset ownership
 or to their respective investment vehicles.

(B) Financial statements of an investment fund, an asset ownership or their respective invest-ment vehicles.

(C) Meeting materials of an investment fund, an asset ownership or their respective investment
 vehicles.

27 (D) Records containing information regarding the portfolio positions in which an investment 28 fund, an asset ownership or their respective investment vehicles invest.

(E) Capital call and distribution notices of an investment fund, an asset ownership or their re spective investment vehicles.

31 (F) Investment agreements and related documents.

32 (b) The exemption under this subsection does not apply to:

33 (A) The name, address and vintage year of each privately placed investment fund.

(B) The dollar amount of the commitment made to each privately placed investment fund sinceinception of the fund.

36 (C) The dollar amount of cash contributions made to each privately placed investment fund since
 37 inception of the fund.

(D) The dollar amount, on a fiscal year-end basis, of cash distributions received by the State
 Treasurer, the Oregon Investment Council, the Oregon Growth Account Board or the agents of the
 treasurer, council or board from each privately placed investment fund.

(E) The dollar amount, on a fiscal year-end basis, of the remaining value of assets in a privately
placed investment fund attributable to an investment by the State Treasurer, the Oregon Investment
Council, the Oregon Growth Account Board or the agents of the treasurer, council or board.

44 (F) The net internal rate of return of each privately placed investment fund since inception of 45 the fund.

1 (G) The investment multiple of each privately placed investment fund since inception of the fund.

2 (H) The dollar amount of the total management fees and costs paid on an annual fiscal year-end 3 basis to each privately placed investment fund.

4 (I) The dollar amount of cash profit received from each privately placed investment fund on a 5 fiscal year-end basis.

6 (15) The monthly reports prepared and submitted under ORS 293.761 and 293.766 concerning the 7 Public Employees Retirement Fund and the Industrial Accident Fund may be uniformly treated as 8 exempt from disclosure for a period of up to 90 days after the end of the calendar quarter.

9 (16) Reports of unclaimed property filed by the holders of such property to the extent permitted
10 by ORS 98.352.

(17) The following records, communications and information submitted to the Oregon Economic and Community Development Commission, the Economic and Community Development Department, the State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Growth Account Board, the Port of Portland or other ports, as defined in ORS 777.005, by applicants for investment funds, loans or services including, but not limited to, those described in ORS 285A.224:

16 (a) Personal financial statements.

17 (b) Financial statements of applicants.

18 (c) Customer lists.

(d) Information of an applicant pertaining to litigation to which the applicant is a party if the complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the applicant shows that such litigation is reasonably likely to occur; this exemption does not apply to litigation which has been concluded, and nothing in this paragraph shall limit any right or opportunity granted by discovery or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or potential litigation.

24 (e) Production, sales and cost data.

(f) Marketing strategy information that relates to applicant's plan to address specific markets
 and applicant's strategy regarding specific competitors.

27(18) Records, reports or returns submitted by private concerns or enterprises required by law to be submitted to or inspected by a governmental body to allow it to determine the amount of any 28transient lodging tax payable and the amounts of such tax payable or paid, to the extent that such 2930 information is in a form which would permit identification of the individual concern or enterprise. 31 Nothing in this subsection shall limit the use which can be made of such information for regulatory 32purposes or its admissibility in any enforcement proceedings. The public body shall notify the taxpayer of the delinquency immediately by certified mail. However, in the event that the payment or 33 34 delivery of transient lodging taxes otherwise due to a public body is delinquent by over 60 days, the 35 public body shall disclose, upon the request of any person, the following information:

(a) The identity of the individual concern or enterprise that is delinquent over 60 days in the
 payment or delivery of the taxes.

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(b) The period for which the taxes are delinquent.

(c) The actual, or estimated, amount of the delinquency.

(19) All information supplied by a person under ORS 151.485 for the purpose of requesting appointed counsel, and all information supplied to the court from whatever source for the purpose of verifying the financial eligibility of a person pursuant to ORS 151.485.

(20) Workers' compensation claim records of the Department of Consumer and Business Services,
except in accordance with rules adopted by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services, in any of the following circumstances:

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1	(a) When necessary for insurers, self-insured employers and third party claim administrators to
2	process workers' compensation claims.
3	(b) When necessary for the director, other governmental agencies of this state or the United
4	States to carry out their duties, functions or powers.
5	(c) When the disclosure is made in such a manner that the disclosed information cannot be used
6	to identify any worker who is the subject of a claim.
7	(d) When a worker or the worker's representative requests review of the worker's claim record.
8	(21) Sensitive business records or financial or commercial information of the Oregon Health and
9	Science University that is not customarily provided to business competitors.
10	(22) Records of Oregon Health and Science University regarding candidates for the position of
11	president of the university.
12	(23) The records of a library, including:
13	(a) Circulation records, showing use of specific library material by a named person;
14	(b) The name of a library patron together with the address or telephone number of the patron;
15	and
16	(c) The electronic mail address of a patron.
17	(24) The following records, communications and information obtained by the Housing and Com-
18	munity Services Department in connection with the department's monitoring or administration of
19	financial assistance or of housing or other developments:
20	(a) Personal and corporate financial statements and information, including tax returns.
21	(b) Credit reports.
22	(c) Project appraisals.
23	(d) Market studies and analyses.
24	(e) Articles of incorporation, partnership agreements and operating agreements.
25	(f) Commitment letters.
26	(g) Project pro forma statements.
27	(h) Project cost certifications and cost data.
28	(i) Audits.
29	(j) Project tenant correspondence.
30	(k) Personal information about a tenant.
31	(L) Housing assistance payments.
32	(25) Raster geographic information system (GIS) digital databases, provided by private forestland
33	owners or their representatives, voluntarily and in confidence to the State Forestry Department,
34	that is not otherwise required by law to be submitted.
35	(26) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by a
36	public body engaged in the business of providing electricity or electricity services, if the information
37	is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 261.348, or if the information is directly related
38	to a bid, proposal or negotiations for the sale or purchase of electricity or electricity services, and
39	disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the public body or its re-
40	tail electricity customers. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the de-
41	velopment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.
42	(27) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by the
43	City of Klamath Falls, acting solely in connection with the ownership and operation of the Klamath
44	Cogeneration Project, if the information is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 225.085

45 and disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the Klamath

1 Cogeneration Project. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the develop-

2 ment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.

(28) Personally identifiable information about customers of a municipal electric utility or a 3 people's utility district or the names, dates of birth, driver license numbers, telephone numbers, 4 electronic mail addresses or Social Security numbers of customers who receive water, sewer or 5 storm drain services from a public body as defined in ORS 174.109. The utility or district may re-6 lease personally identifiable information about a customer, and a public body providing water, sewer 7 or storm drain services may release the name, date of birth, driver license number, telephone num-8 9 ber, electronic mail address or Social Security number of a customer, if the customer consents in writing or electronically, if the disclosure is necessary for the utility, district or other public body 10 to render services to the customer, if the disclosure is required pursuant to a court order or if the 11 12 disclosure is otherwise required by federal or state law. The utility, district or other public body 13 may charge as appropriate for the costs of providing such information. The utility, district or other public body may make customer records available to third party credit agencies on a regular basis 14 15 in connection with the establishment and management of customer accounts or in the event such 16 accounts are delinquent.

17 (29) A record of the street and number of an employee's address submitted to a special district 18 to obtain assistance in promoting an alternative to single occupant motor vehicle transportation.

(30) Sensitive business records, capital development plans or financial or commercial information
 of Oregon Corrections Enterprises that is not customarily provided to business competitors.

(31) Documents, materials or other information submitted to the Director of the Department of
Consumer and Business Services in confidence by a state, federal, foreign or international regulatory
or law enforcement agency or by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners, its affiliates
or subsidiaries under ORS 646A.250 to 646A.270, 697.005 to 697.095, 697.602 to 697.842, 705.137,
717.200 to 717.320, 717.900 or 717.905, ORS chapter 59, 722, 723, 725 or 726, the Bank Act or the
Insurance Code when:

(a) The document, material or other information is received upon notice or with an understanding that it is confidential or privileged under the laws of the jurisdiction that is the source of
the document, material or other information; and

30 (b) The director has obligated the Department of Consumer and Business Services not to dis-31 close the document, material or other information.

32 (32) A county elections security plan developed and filed under ORS 254.074.

33 (33) Information about review or approval of programs relating to the security of:

34 (a) Generation, storage or conveyance of:

35 (A) Electricity;

36 (B) Gas in liquefied or gaseous form;

37 (C) Hazardous substances as defined in ORS 453.005 (7)(a), (b) and (d);

38 (D) Petroleum products;

39 (E) Sewage; or

40 (F) Water.

41 (b) Telecommunication systems, including cellular, wireless or radio systems.

42 (c) Data transmissions by whatever means provided.

43 (34) The information specified in ORS 25.020 (8) if the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court des-

44 ignates the information as confidential by rule under ORS 1.002.

45 (35) Records or information that identify a person as a holder of, or an applicant for, a

concealed handgun license issued under ORS 166.291 and 166.292. This exemption does not 1 2 apply if the party seeking disclosure: (a) Requests records or information pursuant to a subpoena or court order; or 3 (b) Shows by clear and convincing evidence that the public interest requires disclosure 4 in the particular instance. In making this determination, the custodian shall consider any 5 information provided by an affected holder of, or applicant for, a concealed handgun license. 6 SECTION 2. ORS 166.291 is amended to read: 7 166.291. (1) The sheriff of a county, upon a person's application for an Oregon concealed 8 9 handgun license, upon receipt of the appropriate fees and after compliance with the procedures set out in this section, shall issue the person a concealed handgun license if the person: 10 (a)(A) Is a citizen of the United States; or 11 12 (B) Is a legal resident alien who can document continuous residency in the county for at least 13 six months and has declared in writing to the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services the intent to acquire citizenship status and can present proof of the written declaration to the 14 15 sheriff at the time of application for the license; 16 (b) Is at least 21 years of age; (c) Is a resident of the county; 17 18 (d) Has no outstanding warrants for arrest; (e) Is not free on any form of pretrial release; 19 (f) Demonstrates competence with a handgun by any one of the following: 20(A) Completion of any hunter education or hunter safety course approved by the State Depart-2122ment of Fish and Wildlife or a similar agency of another state if handgun safety was a component of the course; 23(B) Completion of any National Rifle Association firearms safety or training course if handgun 24safety was a component of the course; 25(C) Completion of any firearms safety or training course or class available to the general public 2627offered by law enforcement, community college, or private or public institution or organization or firearms training school utilizing instructors certified by the National Rifle Association or a law 28enforcement agency if handgun safety was a component of the course; 2930 (D) Completion of any law enforcement firearms safety or training course or class offered for 31 security guards, investigators, reserve law enforcement officers or any other law enforcement offi-32cers if handgun safety was a component of the course; (E) Presents evidence of equivalent experience with a handgun through participation in organ-33 34 ized shooting competition or military service; (F) Is licensed or has been licensed to carry a firearm in this state, unless the license has been 35 revoked; or 36 37 (G) Completion of any firearms training or safety course or class conducted by a firearms in-38 structor certified by a law enforcement agency or the National Rifle Association if handgun safety

39 was a component of the course;

40 (g) Has never been convicted of a felony or found guilty, except for insanity under ORS 161.295,
41 of a felony;

42 (h) Has not been convicted of a misdemeanor or found guilty, except for insanity under ORS
43 161.295, of a misdemeanor within the four years prior to the application;

(i) Has not been committed to the Department of Human Services under ORS 426.130;

45 (j) Has not been found to be mentally ill and is not subject to an order under ORS 426.130 that

the person be prohibited from purchasing or possessing a firearm as a result of that mental illness; 1 2 (k) Has been discharged from the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for more than four years if, while a minor, the person was found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having 3 committed an act that, if committed by an adult, would constitute a felony or a misdemeanor in-4 volving violence, as defined in ORS 166.470;  $\mathbf{5}$ 

(L) Has not been convicted of an offense involving controlled substances or participated in a 6 court-supervised drug diversion program, except this disability does not operate to exclude a person 7 if: 8

9 (A) The person has been convicted only once of violating ORS 475.864 (3) and has not completed a court-supervised drug diversion program under ORS 135.907; or 10

(B) The person has completed a court-supervised drug diversion program under ORS 135.907 and 11 12 has not been convicted of violating ORS 475.864 (3);

(m) Is not subject to a citation issued under ORS 163.735 or an order issued under ORS 30.866, 13107.700 to 107.735 or 163.738; 14

15 (n) Has not received a dishonorable discharge from the Armed Forces of the United States; and 16 (o) Is not required to register as a sex offender in any state.

(2) A person who has been granted relief under ORS 166.274 or 166.293 or 18 U.S.C. 925(c) or 17 has had the person's record expunged under the laws of this state or equivalent laws of other ju-18 19 risdictions is not subject to the disabilities in subsection (1)(g) to (L) of this section.

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(3) Before the sheriff may issue a license:

(a) The application must state the applicant's legal name, current address and telephone number, 2122date and place of birth, hair and eye color and height and weight. The application must also list the 23applicant's residence address or addresses for the previous three years. The application must contain a statement by the applicant that the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1) of this 2425section. The application may include the Social Security number of the applicant if the applicant voluntarily provides this number. The application must be signed by the applicant. 26

27(b) The applicant must submit to fingerprinting and photographing by the sheriff. The sheriff shall fingerprint and photograph the applicant and shall conduct any investigation necessary to 28corroborate the requirements listed under subsection (1) of this section. If a nationwide criminal 2930 records check is necessary, the sheriff shall request the Department of State Police to conduct the 31 check, including fingerprint identification, through the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The Federal Bureau of Investigation shall return the fingerprint cards used to conduct the criminal records 32check and may not keep any record of the fingerprints. The Department of State Police shall report 33 34 the results of the fingerprint-based criminal records check to the sheriff. The Department of State 35 Police shall also furnish the sheriff with any information about the applicant that the Department of State Police may have in its possession from its central bureau of criminal identification includ-36 37 ing, but not limited to, manual or computerized criminal offender information.

38 (4) Application forms for concealed handgun licenses shall be supplied by the sheriff upon request. The forms shall be uniform throughout the state in substantially the following form: 39

7 <u>SECTION 3.</u> A person denied the right to inspect or to receive a copy of a public record 8 under ORS 192.502 (35) may petition the Attorney General or, if the person is denied the right 9 to inspect or to receive a copy of a public record under ORS 192.502 (35) by a public body 10 other than a state agency, the district attorney to review the public record to determine if 11 it may be withheld from public inspection. Review of the petition shall be conducted in ac-12 cordance with ORS 192.450 or 192.460. The provisions of ORS 192.465 (1), 192.470 and 192.490 13 apply to the review.

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**SECTION 4.** ORS 192.480 is amended to read:

15 192.480. Except as provided in section 3 of this 2009 Act, in any case in which a person is denied the right to inspect or to receive a copy of a public record in the custody of an elected of-16 17 ficial, or in the custody of any other person but as to which an elected official claims the right to 18 withhold disclosure, no petition to require disclosure may be filed with the Attorney General or district attorney, or if a petition is filed it shall not be considered by the Attorney General or dis-19 20trict attorney after a claim of right to withhold disclosure by an elected official. In such case a person denied the right to inspect or to receive a copy of a public record may institute proceedings 2122for injunctive or declaratory relief in the appropriate circuit court, as specified in ORS 192.450 or 23192.460, and the Attorney General or district attorney may upon request serve or decline to serve, in the discretion of the Attorney General or district attorney, as counsel in such suit for an elected 2425official for which the Attorney General or district attorney ordinarily serves as counsel. Nothing in this section shall preclude an elected official from requesting advice from the Attorney General or 2627a district attorney as to whether a public record should be disclosed.

28 <u>SECTION 5.</u> (1) The amendments to ORS 166.291 by section 2 of this 2009 Act apply to 29 applications provided to an applicant on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act.

(2) Nothing in the amendments to ORS 166.291 by section 2 of this 2009 Act prohibits a
 current holder of a concealed handgun license from providing a public body with information
 relevant to the determination described in ORS 192.502 (35)(b).

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
