House Joint Resolution 32

Sponsored by Representative THATCHER; Representatives KRIEGER, OLSON, WEIDNER, WHISNANT

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Encourages state agencies to adopt compressed schedule in which employees work 10-hour days during four-day workweek.

JOINT RESOLUTION

2 Whereas high gas prices have significantly burdened Oregon families; and

3 Whereas it is recognized that while state employees in Oregon provide valuable services, they 4 often receive lower compensation than those employed in the private sector; and

5 Whereas in an effort to provide financial relief to state employees and their families due to high 6 gas prices, compressed workweek schedules should be adopted by state agencies; and

7 Whereas compressed workweek schedules provide advantages to both employers and employees 8 in terms of cost savings and increased productivity, as well as environmental benefits; and

9 Whereas a compressed workweek consists of an ordinary number of working hours performed 10 on fewer than the number of days ordinarily required to perform that job; and

11 Whereas studies on compressed workweeks have twice shown that the benefits of a compressed 12 workweek far outweigh the administrative costs of setup, with benefits such as increasing employee 13 productivity, recruitment and retention, and reducing child care costs, traffic congestion and gas 14 consumption; and

15 Whereas compressed workweeks are also beneficial in helping citizens access governmental 16 services, in that normal business hours may limit their ability to access their government during the 17 hours that they work, too; and

18 Whereas several states offer compressed workweeks, as well as Clackamas County; and

19 Whereas 79 percent of federal government agencies and 60 percent of private firms offer com-

20 pressed workweeks; now, therefore,

21 Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

That the Oregon Legislative Assembly strongly encourages state agencies to adopt a compressed schedule, in which employees work 10 hours a day during a four-day week; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be distributed to the director or other administrator of each state agency.

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
