SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Revises laws relating to civil forfeiture. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

8	Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
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10	DEFINITIONS
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12	SECTION 1. Definitions. As used in sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act:
13	(1) "All persons known to have an interest" means:
14	(a) Any person who filed a notice of interest for seized property with any public office,
15	in the manner required or permitted by law, before the property was seized for forfeiture;
16	(b) Any person from whose custody property is seized for forfeiture; and
17	(c) Any person who has an interest in property seized for forfeiture, including all owners
18	and occupants of the property, whose identity and address is known or is ascertainable upon
19	diligent inquiry and whose rights and interest in the property may be affected by the action.
20	(2) "Attorney fees" has the meaning given that term in ORCP 68 A.
21	(3) "Financial institution" means any person lawfully conducting business as:
22	(a) A financial institution or trust company, as those terms are defined in ORS 706.008;
23	(b) A consumer finance company subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 725;
24	(c) A mortgage banker or a mortgage broker as those terms are defined in ORS 59.840,
25	a mortgage servicing company or other mortgage company;
26	(d) An officer, agency, department or instrumentality of the federal government, includ-
27	ing but not limited to:
28	(A) The Secretary of Housing and Urban Development;

1	(B) The Federal Housing Administration;
2	(C) The United States Department of Veterans Affairs;
3	(D) Rural Development and the Farm Service Agency of the United States Department
4	of Agriculture;
5	(E) The Federal National Mortgage Association;
6	(F) The Government National Mortgage Administration;
7	(G) The Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation;
8	(H) The Federal Agricultural Mortgage Corporation; and
9	(I) The Small Business Administration;
10	(e) An agency, department or instrumentality of the state, including but not limited to:
11	(A) The Housing Agency;
12	(B) The Department of Veterans' Affairs; and
13	(C) The Public Employees Retirement System;
14	(f) An agency, department or instrumentality of any local government, as defined by ORS
15	174.116 or special government body, as defined by ORS 174.117, including but not limited to
16	such agencies as the Portland Development Commission;
17	(g) An insurer as defined in ORS 731.106;
18	(h) A private mortgage insurance company;
19	(i) A pension plan or fund or other retirement plan; and
20	(j) A broker-dealer or investment adviser as defined in ORS 59.015.
21	(4) "Forfeiting agency" means a public body that is seeking forfeiture of property under
22	sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act.
23	(5) "Forfeiture counsel" means an attorney designated by a forfeiting agency to represent
24	the forfeiting agency in forfeiture proceedings.
25	(6) "Forfeiture proceeds" means all property that has been forfeited in a proceeding un-
26	der sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act, including money, earnings from forfeited property and
27	amounts realized from the sale of forfeited property.
28	(7) "Instrumentality" has the meaning given in ORS 131.550.
29	(8) "Law enforcement agency" means any agency that employs police officers or prose-
30	cutes criminal cases.
31	(9) "Police officer" has the meaning given that term in ORS 133.525.
32	(10) "Proceeds of prohibited conduct" means property derived directly or indirectly from
33	prohibited conduct, or maintained by or realized through prohibited conduct. "Proceeds of
34	prohibited conduct" includes any benefit, interest or property of any kind, without reduction
35	for expenses of acquiring or maintaining the property.
36	(11) "Prohibited conduct" means:
37	(a) Violation of, solicitation to violate, attempt to violate or conspiracy to violate a pro-
38	vision of ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.805 to 475.980 when the conduct constitutes the
39	commission of a crime as described in ORS 161.515; and
40	(b) Other conduct that constitutes the commission of a crime as described in ORS
41	161.515, that provides for civil forfeiture of proceeds or instrumentalities of the conduct and
42	that is made subject to the provisions of sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act under section 2 (4)
43	of this 2009 Act or other law.
44	(12) "Property" means any interest in anything of value, including the whole of any lot
45	or tract of land and tangible and intangible personal property, including currency, instru-

ments or securities or any other kind of privilege, interest, claim or right whether due or 1 2 to become due. (13) "Public body" has the meaning given in ORS 174.109. 3 (14) "Seizing agency" means a law enforcement agency that has seized property for 4 forfeiture. 5 (15) "Weapon" means any instrument of offensive or defensive combat or anything used, 6 or designed to be used, in destroying, defeating or injuring a person. 7 8 9 **CIVIL FORFEITURE GENERALLY** 10 SECTION 2. Legislative findings; preemption of local laws; remedy not exclusive. (1) The 11 12Legislative Assembly finds that: 13 (a) Prohibited conduct occurs in the course of criminal activities that result in, and are facilitated by, the acquisition, possession or transfer of property subject to civil forfeiture 14 under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act. 15 (b) Transactions involving property subject to civil forfeiture under sections 1 to 51 of 16 this 2009 Act escape taxation. 17 18 (c) Governments attempting to respond to prohibited conduct require additional resources. 19 (d) Proceeds and instrumentalities of prohibited conduct should be forfeited, the rights 20and interests of affected persons protected, and the laws of this state relating to civil 2122forfeiture of property based on prohibited conduct should be uniform throughout the state. 23(2) The Legislative Assembly adopts the provisions of sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act as the sole and exclusive law of the state governing civil forfeiture of real and personal property 24based on prohibited conduct. Sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act supersede all charter pro-25visions, ordinances, regulations and other enactments adopted by cities and counties relating 2627to civil forfeitures. All forfeitures under the provisions of sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act are subject to the limitations of section 10, Article XV of the Oregon Constitution. 28(3) Sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act are applicable throughout this state. The electors or 2930 the governing body of a city or county may not enact, and the governing body of a city or 31 county may not enforce, any charter provision, ordinance, resolution or other regulation that is inconsistent with this section. 32(4) Sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act do not impair the right of any city or county to enact 33 34 ordinances providing for the civil forfeiture of property if: 35 (a) The prohibited conduct constitutes the commission of a crime as described in ORS 161.515; 36 37 (b) The property constitutes proceeds or instrumentalities of the prohibited conduct; and 38 (c) The civil forfeiture is subject to the procedures and limitations set forth in sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act. 39 (5) Sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act do not limit or impair any right or remedy that any 40 person or entity may have under ORS 166.715 to 166.735. The application of any remedy under 41 sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act is remedial and not punitive and does not affect the appli-42 cation of any other civil or criminal remedy under any other provision of law. Civil remedies 43 under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act are supplemental and are not mutually exclusive. 44 SECTION 3. Vesting of title to forfeited property. Subject to sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 45

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Act, all right, title and interest in property forfeited under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act 1 vests in the forfeiting agency upon the occurrence of the prohibited conduct on which the 2 forfeiture is based. 3 4 **PROPERTY SUBJECT TO FORFEITURE** 5 6 SECTION 4. Property subject to forfeiture. The following property is subject to forfeiture 7 under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act: 8 9 (1) All controlled substances that have been manufactured, distributed, dispensed, possessed or acquired in the course of prohibited conduct. 10 (2) All raw materials, products and equipment of any kind that are used in providing, 11 12manufacturing, compounding, processing, delivering, importing or exporting any service or substance in the course of prohibited conduct. 13 (3) All property that is used as a container for property described in subsection (1) or (2) 14 15 of this section. (4) All conveyances, including aircraft, vehicles or vessels, that are used to transport or 16 in any manner facilitate the transportation, sale, receipt, possession or concealment of 17 property described in subsection (1) or (2) of this section, and all conveyances, including 18 aircraft, vehicles or vessels, that are used in prohibited conduct or that are used to facilitate 19 20prohibited conduct in any manner. (5) All books, records, computers and research, including formulae, microfilm, tapes and 2122data that are used to facilitate prohibited conduct in any manner. 23(6) All moneys, negotiable instruments, balances in deposit accounts or other accounts, securities or other things of value furnished by any person in the course of prohibited con-24duct, all proceeds of prohibited conduct, and all moneys, negotiable instruments, balances in 25deposit and other accounts and securities used to facilitate any prohibited conduct. 2627(7) All real property, including any right, title and interest in the whole of any lot or tract of land and any appurtenances or improvements, that is used in any manner, in whole 28or part, to commit or facilitate prohibited conduct. 2930 (8) All weapons possessed, used or available for use in any manner to facilitate prohibited 31 conduct. (9) Any property described in this section that was intended for use in committing or 32facilitating an attempt to commit a crime as described in ORS 161.405, a solicitation as de-33 34 scribed in ORS 161.435 or a conspiracy as described in ORS 161.450. SECTION 5. Consensual search of motor vehicle; required notice. (1) Notwithstanding any 35 other provision of sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act, property that is seized solely on the basis 36 37 of a consensual search of a motor vehicle is not subject to forfeiture unless, before obtaining 38 the consent of a person for the search, the person is provided with written, multilingual notice of the right of the person to refuse to consent to the search. The notice shall include 39 at least the following information: 40 (a) Notice that the person has a right to refuse to consent to a search. 41 (b) Notice that a refusal to consent to a search cannot be used against the person for 42 43 any purpose.

44 (c) Notice that anything found in the search can be seized as evidence of a crime or can
45 be seized for forfeiture.

1	(2) A notice or consent form under this section shall be considered multilingual if the
2	notice or form provides information in at least English and Spanish.
3	SECTION 6. Seizure of currency. Notwithstanding any other provision of sections 1 to
4	51 of this 2009 Act, United States currency in an amount less than \$15,000 may not be seized
5	for forfeiture solely on the basis that the money is in the form of cash rather than some
6	other form.
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8	SEIZURE OF PROPERTY FOR FORFEITURE
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10	(Generally)
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12	SECTION 7. Seizure generally. (1) Property seized for forfeiture is not subject to replevin
13	conveyance, sequestration or attachment, and is not subject to a motion or order to return
14	under ORS chapter 133.
15	(2) Property that has been unconstitutionally seized may be forfeited if the property is
16	determined to be subject to forfeiture under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act based on evi-
17	dence that is not the fruit of the unconstitutional seizure.
18	(3) Property other than real property may be constructively seized by affixing a forfeiture
19	notice to the property, or by recording a forfeiture notice in the public record. Real property
20	including equitable interests under land sale contracts, may be seized only by recording a
21	forfeiture notice in the form prescribed by section 19 of this 2009 Act.
22	(4) If property is seized from the possession of a person who has a possessory lien in the
23	property, the lien remains in effect after the seizure and is enforceable as though the person
24	had retained possession of the property.
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26	(Inventory and receipt; written warning)
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28	SECTION 8. Inventory and receipt. (1) Promptly upon seizure of property for forfeiture
29	the police officer who seized the property shall make an inventory of the seized property
30	The inventory may contain an estimate of the value of the seized property.
31	(2) If seized property is taken from the possession of a person, or there is a person who
32	is in apparent control of the property at the time of the seizure, the officer shall deliver a
33	receipt to that person when the property is seized. The receipt prepared under this sub-
34	section must contain:
35	(a) The inventory prepared under subsection (1) of this section;
36	(b) The identity of the seizing agency; and
37	(c) The address and telephone number of the office or other place where the person may
38	obtain further information concerning the forfeiture.
39	(3) A seizing agency shall amend the inventory prepared by a police officer under this
40	section if the agency determines at any time before the commencement of a forfeiture action
41	under section 26 of this 2009 Act that the inventory is substantially incorrect. The changes
42	to the inventory must be clearly indicated in the amended inventory. A copy of the original
43	inventory and any amendments made to the original inventory must be served with any
44	summons and complaint served under section 27 of this 2009 Act. If the amendment occurs
45	after the commencement of a forfeiture action, the amended inventory must be served on

1 all persons previously served with summons and complaint in the proceeding.

2 (4) If tangible personal property is constructively seized as described in section 7 (3) of 3 this 2009 Act, the officer shall affix the receipt to the property. If the property is physically 4 removed from the place of seizure, and the place is unoccupied or nobody is present with 5 apparent control over the property, the officer shall promptly file the receipt in the public 6 records of the forfeiting agency.

(Manner of seizure)

10 <u>SECTION 9.</u> Seizure with court order. (1) Property may be seized by any police officer 11 pursuant to an order of the court. Forfeiture counsel or a seizing agency may apply for an 12 ex parte order directing seizure of specified property.

(2) An application for an order directing seizure under subsection (1) of this section may be made to any judge as defined in ORS 133.525. The application shall be supported by one or more affidavits setting forth facts and circumstances that support a finding that probable cause exists to believe that the described property is subject to forfeiture. The court shall issue the order upon a finding of probable cause to believe that the described property is subject to forfeiture. The order may be made as part of a search warrant.

(3) An order issued under this section may specify the manner in which intangible prop erty may be seized for forfeiture.

(4) Except as provided in section 13 (3) of this 2009 Act, an order under this section shall
direct any person having control or custody of the property, including money and other assets held in the form of an account in a financial institution, to deliver the property to the
police officer.

25 <u>SECTION 10.</u> Seizure without court order. (1) Property may be seized for forfeiture by a
 26 police officer without a court order if:

(a) There is probable cause to believe that property is subject to forfeiture, and the
 property may constitutionally be seized without a warrant;

(b) The seizure is in the course of a constitutionally valid criminal investigative stop,
 arrest or search, and there is probable cause to believe that the property is subject to
 forfeiture;

(c) The property is directly or indirectly dangerous to the health or safety of any person;
 or

34 (d) An owner consents to the seizure.

(2) If a police officer finds cash, weapons or negotiable instruments in close proximity to
 controlled substances or to instrumentalities of prohibited conduct, the officer has probable
 cause to believe that the property is subject to forfeiture.

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39 40 (Delivery of property)

41 <u>SECTION 11.</u> Delivery by third person. (1) Except as provided in section 13 (3) of this 2009 42 Act, a person who has control or custody of property must deliver the property to a police 43 officer if the police officer presents a court order issued under section 9 of this 2009 Act or 44 the police officer has probable cause to believe that the property is subject to forfeiture.

45 (2) Any person who delivers property in obedience to a court order or pursuant to a di-

rection from a police officer is not liable to any person by reason of the delivery, and is not liable for any costs incurred by reason of any contamination of the delivered property, including but not limited to any disposal costs for the property, any hazardous waste or material, any contraband or any other contamination contained in property seized under this section.

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(Effect of seizure on liens and security interests of financial institutions)

SECTION 12. Liens and security interests of financial institutions. (1) Seizure of property 10 for forfeiture and other proceedings under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act does not prevent, 11 12abate or delay the initiation or prosecution of a suit or action by a financial institution for the possession of seized property in which the financial institution claims a lien or security 13 interest, or initiation or prosecution of a suit or action by a financial institution for the 14 15foreclosure of a lien or security interest claimed by the financial institution. A financial in-16 stitution may proceed with any suit or action involving property in which the institution claims a lien or security interest even though a seizure has occurred and a forfeiture action 17 18 has been commenced or will be commenced. The financial institution's suit or action may 19 be consolidated with the forfeiture action for the purpose of trial. If seized property is sold 20before the conclusion of the forfeiture action, the sheriff, trustee or other person who is conducting the sale and who has actual notice of the forfeiture action shall distribute the 2122sale proceeds as follows:

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(a) To the payment of the expenses of the sale.

(b) After payment of the expenses of the sale, to the payment of the obligations owed to the foreclosing financial institution that are secured by the property, and to the payment of the obligations owed to any other person that has a lien or security interest in the property that has been foreclosed in the suit or action. Payment under this paragraph shall be made in the order determined by the court.

(c) If there is any remaining amount after the payments required under paragraphs (a)
and (b) of this subsection, the remaining amount shall be distributed to the seizing or forfeiting agency, or to the court in which the forfeiture action is pending.

(2) A sheriff, trustee or other person who distributes sale proceeds as provided in sub section (1) of this section is not liable to any person who has or asserts an interest in the
 property.

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<u>SECTION 13.</u> Care and custody of seized property generally. (1) Pending final disposition of seized property, and subject to the need to retain the property for any criminal proceeding, a forfeiting agency shall maintain and care for property that is in the physical custody of the seizing or forfeiting agency in a manner that is reasonably appropriate for the preservation of the property's value.

(Care and custody of property)

(2) A forfeiting agency may transfer property seized for forfeiture to any city, county,
 state or federal agency with authority to seek forfeiture of the property, unless the transfer
 diminishes or reduces the rights of any third party under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act

1 or constitutes a violation of section 10 (13), Article XV of the Oregon Constitution.

2 (3) If property seized for forfeiture consists of money, stocks, bonds, promissory notes or other security or evidence of indebtedness, and the property is held in some form of ac-3 count in a financial institution, the property may remain in the account pending a final de-4 cision in the forfeiture action. Unless otherwise allowed by order of the court, transactions 5 involving the account are not permitted until final disposition of the property, except for the 6 deposit or reinvestment of dividends or other normally recurring payments on the property. 7 Any accrual to the value of the property during the pendency of forfeiture proceedings shall 8 9 be disbursed in the manner provided for the disbursement of interest under section 15 of this 2009 Act. 10

(4) Sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act do not prevent a seizing agency from entering into an agreement with a person who claims seized property, or with any other person, for the reimbursement of the seizing agency for the costs and expenses relating to towing and storage of seized property, or for the reimbursement of the cost of discharging any possessory chattel lien on the property arising under ORS 87.152 to 87.162 that attaches to the property after seizure of the property and before release or forfeiture of the property.

SECTION 14. Order for sale, lease, rental or operation of seized property. (1) Pending 1718 final disposition of property seized for forfeiture, and subject to the need to retain the 19 property for any criminal proceeding, a forfeiting agency may apply to the court for an order 20allowing the seized property to be sold, leased, rented or operated in the manner and on terms that may be specified in the court's order. Any sale, lease, rental or operation of 2122seized property under this section must be conducted in a commercially reasonable manner, 23and may not result in a material reduction of the property's value. An order may be entered under this section only: 24

(a) After notice and opportunity to be heard is provided to all persons known to have an
 interest in the property, or who claim to have an interest in the property; and

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(b) With the consent of all persons holding security interests of record in the property.

(2) Unless otherwise ordered by the court, the proceeds of the sale, lease, rental or operation of seized property under this section shall be held by the forfeiting agency in a
forfeiture trust account established under section 15 of this 2009 Act, and the rights of
holders of security interests of record in the property attach to the proceeds of the sale,
lease, rental or operation in the order of the priority of their claims.

33 <u>SECTION 15.</u> Forfeiture trust accounts. (1) Except for currency with collector value, all 34 money seized for forfeiture, together with all money received from the sale, lease, rental or 35 operation of seized property, shall be immediately deposited in an insured interest-bearing 36 forfeiture trust account or accounts maintained by the seizing or forfeiting agency exclu-37 sively for this purpose. Cash may be retained as evidence in a criminal proceeding, but must 38 be deposited in a trust account or trust accounts immediately after the cash is no longer 39 needed as evidence.

40 (2) Subject to any court order, amounts deposited in a forfeiture trust account, or held
41 in an account in a financial institution under section 13 (3) of this 2009 Act, including interest
42 on those amounts, shall be disbursed as follows:

(a) If forfeiture proceedings are abandoned, or if the court ultimately fails to enter a
judgment of forfeiture, the amount of the account shall be disbursed by the seizing or forfeiting agency to the person from whom the property was seized.

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1	(b) If a judgment of forfeiture is entered, but parties other than the forfeiting agency
2	establish rights to portions of the amount deposited in the account that are in the aggregate
3	equal to or larger than the amount in the account, the account shall be disbursed by the
4	forfeiting agency to the parties in the order of the priority of their claims.
5	(c) If a judgment of forfeiture is entered, and the total amount in the account is greater
6	than the amount needed to satisfy the interests of security interest holders, lienholders and
7	other claimants, the balance remaining after payment to those claimants shall be retained
8	by the forfeiting agency for distribution as required by sections 43 and 44 of this 2009 Act.
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10	HEARING ON PROBABLE CAUSE AND DECISION ON SEEKING FORFEITURE
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12	(Hearing on probable cause)
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14	SECTION 16. Hearing on probable cause. (1) Any person with an interest in property that
15	has been seized for forfeiture may file an application to have an order to show cause order
16	issued to a forfeiting agency to determine if probable cause exists to seize the property for
17	forfeiture. The application must be filed not more than 15 days after forfeiture notice is
18	served under section 18 of this 2009 Act, or within 15 days after the person receives actual
19	knowledge of the seizure, whichever is later. A copy of the application must be served on the
20	forfeiture counsel.
21	(2) When a hearing is held on a show cause order issued under this section, the court
22	shall determine if probable cause to seize the property for forfeiture exists on the date of the
23	hearing. If the court finds that probable cause for seizure of the property for forfeiture does
24	not exist, the forfeiting agency shall release the property.
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26	(Decision on seeking forfeiture)
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28	SECTION 17. Decision on seeking forfeiture. (1) A seizing agency, after consultation with
29	the district attorney of the county in which the property was seized, must decide whether
30	to seek forfeiture of seized property not more than 30 days after the property is seized. If
31	the seizing agency elects not to seek forfeiture, the agency shall pay all costs and expenses
32	relating to towing and storage of the property, and shall release the property and cause to
33	be discharged any possessory chattel liens arising under ORS 87.152 to 87.162 that have at-
34	tached to the property since the seizure.
35	(2) Property may be released under this section to a person other than the person from
36	whose custody or control the property was taken if the seizing agency mails notice to the
37	last-known addresses of all persons known to have an interest in the property. The notice
38	shall specify the person to whom the property is to be released and shall detail the time and
39	place of the release.
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41	FORFEITURE NOTICE
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43	(Forfeiture notice)
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45	SECTION 18. Forfeiture notice. (1) A forfeiture notice must contain:

(a) A copy of the inventory prepared by the police officer under section 8 of this 2009 Act, 1 2 with any amendments made under section 8 (3) of this 2009 Act; 3 (b) The name of the person from whom the property was seized; (c) The name, address and telephone number of the seizing agency; 4 $\mathbf{5}$ (d) The address and telephone number of the office or other place where further information concerning the seizure may be obtained; and 6 (e) A statement in substantially the following form: 7 8 9 NOTICE OF SEIZURE FOR FORFEITURE 10 11 Notice to Potential Claimant - Read These Papers Carefully !! 12If you have any interest in the seized property described in these papers, you must claim that interest or you will automatically lose that interest. If you do not file a claim for the 13 property, the property may be forfeited even if you are not convicted of any crime. To claim 14 15an interest, you must file a written claim with the forfeiture counsel named below. The 16written claim must be signed by you, under penalty of perjury, and state: (a) Your true name; (b) The address at which you will accept future mailings from the court and forfeiture 17 18 counsel; and (c) A statement that you have an interest in the seized property. Your deadline 19 for filing the claim document is 21 days from the day this form is given to you. If you have 20any questions, you should see an attorney immediately. 21

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(2) A police officer who seizes property for forfeiture may serve a forfeiture notice on the

(3) If a police officer seizes property for forfeiture and does not serve a forfeiture notice

(4) Except as provided in subsections (5) and (6) of this section, a forfeiting agency shall 2930 make reasonable efforts to serve a forfeiture notice on all persons known to have an interest 31 in the seized property. A person may be served as provided in ORCP 7 D except that summons must include information regarding the right to file a claim as provided by section 21 32of this 2009 Act, if applicable, and the deadline for filing the claim. If the property is cash in 33 34 the amount of \$1,000 or less, or if the fair market value of the property is \$1,000 or less, the forfeiting agency may publish notice of seizure for forfeiture in a newspaper as provided in 35 ORCP 7 D(6)(b) to (d). A copy of the notice and 38 inventory shall be provided to the forfeiting agency's forfeiture counsel.

(5) If a forfeiting agency publishes forfeiture notice under subsection (4) of this section, the agency may include in a single publication as many forfeiture notices as the agency considers convenient. The publication may contain a single statement of matters from the forfeiture notices that are common to all of the notices and that would otherwise result in needless repetition. The publication must contain for each forfeiture notice a separate copy of the inventory and a separate statement of the identity of the person from whose custody the property was seized.

1 <u>SECTION 26.</u> Forfeiture actions generally. (1) A civil forfeiture action in rem may be 2 brought as provided in this section in any case in which forfeiture is sought. A civil forfei-3 ture action must be brought if:

4 (a) The property is real property;

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5 (b) The property is in whole or part a manufactured dwelling as defined in ORS 446.003;

6 (c) The property is a floating home as defined in ORS 830.700;

(d) A claim has been made for the property under section 21 of this 2009 Act; or

8 (e) A person, other than a person who is believed by the forfeiting agency to have en-9 gaged in prohibited conduct, is known to have an interest in the property.

(2) If a claim has been made for seized property under section 21 of this 2009 Act,
forfeiture counsel must commence a forfeiture action not more than 15 days after receipt
of the claim. In all other cases, a forfeiture action must be commenced by forfeiture counsel
within 30 days after seizure of the property.

(3) If the property to be forfeited is real property, the forfeiture action must be commenced in the circuit court for a county in which the property is situated. In all other cases, the forfeiture action must be commenced in the circuit court for the county in which the property was seized, or in the circuit court for the county in which any part of the prohibited conduct took place.

(4) A forfeiture action is commenced by filing a complaint. A copy of the inventory prepared under section 8 of this 2009 Act must be attached to the complaint. The complaint need only allege that there is probable cause for seizure of the property or that a court order was issued under section 9 of this 2009 Act, and need not allege that any claimant has been convicted of a crime. A complaint under this section may be amended at any time to allege that a claimant has been convicted of a crime.

(5) A complaint in a forfeiture action is not subject to a motion to strike, a motion for summary judgment or any other pretrial motion for dismissal that is based solely on the lack of a criminal conviction in support of the forfeiture. This subsection does not affect the ability of a claimant to file a motion to strike or a motion for summary judgment based on the acquittal of the claimant of all criminal charges on which the forfeiture action is based, or based on dismissal of all criminal charges on which the forfeiture action is based.

(6) Forfeiture actions are governed by the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure except to the
 extent those rules conflict with sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act.

(Service of complaint)

<u>SECTION 27.</u> Service. (1) Upon commencement of a forfeiture action, the forfeiting agency must serve the summons and complaint on all persons known to have an interest in the property in the manner provided by ORCP 5 and 7 D. In addition, notice of the action must be published as provided in ORCP 7 D(6)(b) to (d) unless the forfeiture notice for the property was previously published in the manner provided in section 18 (4) of this 2009 Act.

(2) If the property to be forfeited in a forfeiture action is a vehicle, and substitute service
on the claimant is required because personal service cannot be reasonably accomplished,
service in the manner provided by ORCP 7 D(4) is sufficient to establish jurisdiction over a
registered owner or operator of a vehicle.

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(3) If the property to be forfeited in a forfeiture action is in whole or part a manufac-

tured dwelling as defined in ORS 446.003 or a floating home as defined in ORS 830.700, the forfeiting agency must record a notice of seizure containing a description of the manufactured dwelling or floating home in all public offices maintaining records that impart constructive notice of matters relating to manufactured dwellings or floating homes.

(Response to complaint)

8 <u>SECTION 28.</u> <u>Responsive pleading.</u> Except as provided by section 29 of this 2009 Act, a 9 person claiming an interest in property that is the subject of a forfeiture action must file a 10 responsive pleading as provided in the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure. If the person has not 11 previously filed a claim under section 21 of this 2009 Act, a claim as described in section 21 12 (3) of this 2009 Act must be attached to the responsive pleading.

13 <u>SECTION 29.</u> Response by affidavit. (1) In lieu of filing a responsive pleading under sec-14 tion 28 of this 2009 Act, a financial institution holding an interest in the property may re-15 spond to a complaint with an affidavit establishing the financial institution's interest in the 16 property.

(2) In lieu of filing a responsive pleading under section 28 of this 2009 Act, a person who has an interest in the property by reason of being the transferee or conveyor of an interest in the property under a contract for transfer or conveyance of an interest in real property as defined in ORS 93.905 may respond to a complaint in a forfeiture action by filing an affidavit establishing that:

(a) The person did not take the property with the intent to defeat forfeiture of the

(4) A forfeiting agency may file objections to any or all of the assertions made in an affidavit filed under subsection (1) or (2) of this section. The objections must be filed within
20 days after the filing of an affidavit under subsection (1) or (2) of this section. The person
filing the affidavit may respond to the objections by filing a supplemental affidavit limited to
the matters stated in the affidavit of the forfeiting agency. The responding affidavit must
be filed not later than five days after the forfeiting agency files objections.

(5) If a forfeiting agency does not file objections within the time allowed by subsection
(4) of this section, the interest of the person filing the affidavit is conclusively established
for all purposes under sections 1 to 51 of this 2009 Act.

41 <u>SECTION 30.</u> Hearing on objections to affidavit. (1) If a forfeiting agency files objections 42 under section 29 of this 2009 Act, the court shall determine from the affidavits whether there 43 is a genuine issue of material fact with respect to the assertions of the financial institution, 44 transferor, conveyor or successor in interest.

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(2) If the court determines that there is no genuine issue of material fact as to the truth

17 <u>SECTION 31.</u> Foreclosure of security interests, liens and vendor's interest. (1) If a re-18 sponsive pleading or affidavit is filed under section 28 or 29 of this 2009 Act, the court shall 19 foreclose all security interests, liens and vendor's interests in the property, including con-120 tracts for the transfer or conveyance of the property, for which the court determines that 121 there is a legal or equitable basis for foreclosure.

(2) Foreclosure of a security interest, lien or vendor's interest under this section does
not prevent a claimant from obtaining any deficiency to which the claimant would otherwise
be entitled under the law.

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(Standards of proof and defenses)

28 <u>SECTION 32.</u> Standards of proof in forfeiture action. (1) In all forfeiture actions, the 29 forfeiting agency must prove that a person has been convicted of a crime that constitutes 30 prohibited conduct, and that the property to be forfeited is:

31 (a) Proceeds of the crime for which the person has been convicted;

32 (b) An instrumentality of the crime for which the person has been convicted;

(c) Proceeds of one or more other crimes similar to the crime for which the person was
 convicted; or

(d) An instrumentality of one or more other crimes similar to the crime for which the

If the property 8 to be forfeited in a forfeiture action is real property, the forfeiting agency must prove the 9 elements specified in subsection (2) of this section by clear and convincing evidence.

10 (4) For the purposes of subsection (2)(c) of this section, a claimant shall be considered 11 to have acquiesced in prohibited conduct if the claimant knew of the prohibited conduct and 12 failed to take reasonable action under the circumstances to terminate the prohibited conduct 13 or prevent use of the seized property to facilitate the prohibited conduct.

(5) If the forfeiting agency establishes in a forfeiture action that cash, weapons or negotiable instruments were found in close proximity to controlled substances or to instrumentalities of prohibited conduct, the burden is on any person claiming the cash, weapons or negotiable instruments to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the cash, weapnons or negotiable instruments are not proceeds of prohibited conduct or an instrumentality of prohibited conduct.

20 <u>SECTION 33.</u> <u>Affirmative defenses in forfeiture action.</u> (1) A claimant may plead as an 21 affirmative defense that the property was seized in violation of section 5 of this 2009 Act.

(2) In any forfeiture action brought against real property claimed to be an
 instrumentality of prohibited conduct relating to controlled substances, a claimant may plead
 as an affirmative defense that the controlled substance was solely for personal use.

(3) If, by a preponderance of the evidence, the claimant proves a defense under this sec tion by a preponderance of the evidence, the court shall enter judgment for the claimant.

30 <u>SECTION 34.</u> Stays. (1) The court may stay a forfeiture action upon motion of a party 31 and good cause shown. Good cause may include a reasonable fear on the part of a claimant 32 that the claimant could be prosecuted for conduct arising out of the same factual situation 33 that gave rise to the seizure of property. Good cause for a motion made by forfeiture counsel 34 may include the need for additional time to commence or complete a criminal proceeding 35 related to the forfeiture action.

(2) The court may stay a forfeiture action upon the filing of criminal charges that are 36 37 related to the prohibited conduct that is the basis for the action. 2 (4) Any party may file a motion with the court at any time to lift a stay granted under 3 this section if good cause no longer exists for the stay.

4 <u>SECTION 35.</u> Consolidation of actions. (1) A forfeiture action may be consolidated with 5 any other action that relates to the same property or parties on motion by any party in the 6 forfeiture action.

(2) Upon motion by the state or other public body, or any criminal defendant who is also 7a claimant, a forfeiture action under this section may be consolidated for trial or other re-8 9 solution with any related criminal proceeding. Trial or other resolution of the forfeiture action shall immediately follow the resolution of the related criminal proceeding, shall be 10 part of the other proceeding and shall be heard by the same trier of fact. Any objection by 11 12 the defendant to the consolidation, or any motion by the defendant to sever the related 13 criminal case from the forfeiture action, constitutes a waiver of double jeopardy as to the related criminal action and the forfeiture action. 14

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(Special motion for release of property)

18 SECTION 36. Special motion for release of property. (1) Any claimant who is alleged to have engaged in prohibited conduct, and who has filed a responsive pleading or affidavit in 19 20the manner required by section 28 or 29 of this 2009 Act, may file a special motion for the release of all or part of the property subject to the forfeiture action if a criminal action al-2122leging the commission of a crime, as described in ORS 161.515, is not brought against any 23owner of the property within 90 days after the property is seized. The court shall grant the motion except upon good cause shown by the forfeiting agency. The release of the property 2425does not affect the ability of the forfeiting agency to continue the action for the purpose of seeking forfeiture of the released property. 26

(2) A motion under this section may not be made for the release of any property that is
 held as evidence or for protective purposes.

(Judgment)

32 <u>SECTION 37.</u> Judgment forfeiting property generally. (1) A judgment forfeiting property 33 shall recite the basis for the judgment.

(2) After entry of a judgment forfeiting property, the forfeiting agency may transfer good
and sufficient title for the property to purchasers and other transferees, and the title shall
be recognized by all courts and public bodies. Any public body whose official functions include
the issuance of certificates of title or other evidence of title is immune from civil or criminal
liability if the issuance is pursuant to a judgment of forfeiture.

(3) If real property is forfeited under a judgment forfeiting property, the forfeiting agency
shall warrant the title of the property against constitutional defect. A warranty under this
section is limited to the purchase price of the real property.

(4) Forfeiture counsel shall send a copy of each judgment entered in forfeiture proceedings, including ex parte judgments entered under section 25 of this 2009 Act, to the Asset
Forfeiture Oversight Advisory Committee.

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(5) A forfeiting agency may apply to any circuit court judge for a writ of assistance di-

1 recting the sheriff of the county to assist the forfeiting agency in seizing property identified

2 in a judgment forfeiting property.

<u>SECTION 38.</u> Judgment forfeiting property; judgment for forfeiting agency. (1) If a judgment forfeiting property is entered, and the judgment finds against all claimants who have filed a responsive pleading or affidavit under section 28 or 29 of this 2009 Act, title to the forfeited property passes to the forfeiting agency free of any interest or encumbrance in favor of a person who has been given notice of the proceedings.

8 (2) If the court has determined that the property should be forfeited and has not fore-9 closed the interests of any party in the property, the seizing agency shall pay all costs and 10 expenses relating to towing and storage of the property and shall cause to be discharged any 11 possessory chattel liens on the property arising under ORS 87.152 to 87.162 that have at-12 tached to the property since the seizure, and the court shall enter a judgment forfeiting the 13 property to the forfeiting agency, subject to the interests of any claimants for whom judg-14 ment was entered.

(3) If a judgment forfeiting property is entered, all valid interests in the property that
