SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Urges Congress to enact legislation creating Office of the National Nurse.

JOINT MEMORIAL 1 $\mathbf{2}$ To the President of the United States and the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled: 3 4 We, your memorialists, the Seventy-fifth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legis-5 lative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows: 6 Whereas replication and expansion of disease prevention programs could result in a cost savings 7 of \$16 billion annually within the next five years, according to research in a July 2008 report from 8 Trust for America's Health; and 9 Whereas nurses are the largest segment of the nation's health care workforce and are crucial to the promotion of preventative health care and the care of the whole person; and 10 Whereas there are thousands of nurses and nurse educators currently living and working in 11 12 Oregon; and Whereas nurses are highly valued and trusted by the public and, in addition to administering 13health care, are often called upon to deliver educational messages about health maintenance and 14 15disease prevention; and 16 Whereas an Office of the National Nurse would serve as an effective complement to the existing Office of the Surgeon General; and 17Whereas the Office of the National Nurse would act as a public platform to raise awareness of 18 19 health issues and promote health and wellness through education and community outreach; and Whereas the Office of the National Nurse would provide policy input at the federal level on a 20 21number of valuable initiatives, such as providing public service announcements in the media and on 22the Internet to promote wellness initiatives, addressing factors related to nurse and nurse educator 23shortages, facilitating the deployment of nurses to underserved areas, strengthening the Medical 24 Reserve Corps to deliver public health services and providing education to communities, particularly 25communities at risk or in crisis; and 26 Whereas a serious effort is under way to create an Office of the National Nurse, with legislation 27introduced in the 109th Congress that garnered the bipartisan support of 42 members, including the 28entire Oregon House delegation; now, therefore, 29 Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:
