Senate Joint Resolution 1

Printed pursuant to Senate Interim Rule 213.28 by order of the President of the Senate in conformance with presession filing rules, indicating neither advocacy nor opposition on the part of the President (at the request of Senate Interim Committee on Health and Human Services)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Directs Department of Human Services to review immunization requirements.

JOINT RESOLUTION 1 $\mathbf{2}$ Whereas Oregon law requires that children meet immunization requirements before attending 3 school or entering a children's facility in this state; and Whereas immunizations are required for all children entering a child care facility, preschool, 4 kindergarten or seventh grade and for all students entering school in Oregon for the first time; and $\mathbf{5}$ 6 Whereas immunization requirements include immunizations for diptheria, tetanus, pertussis, 7 polio, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis A and B, haemophilus influenzae Type b and varicella; and 8 Whereas invasive pneumococcal disease is a result of life-threatening infections caused by the bacterium streptococcus pneumoniae and includes bacterial meningitis, bacteremia, sepsis and 9 10 bacteremic pneumonia; and 11 Whereas Oregon's overall immunization rate, according to the Centers for Disease Control and 12 Prevention, is 73 percent, placing Oregon 39th among all states; and 13Whereas the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that Oregon's immunization 14 rate for a complete cycle of immunizations against pneumoccoccal disease is 67 percent; and Whereas immunizations remain the best defense available today against infectious diseases; and 1516 Whereas the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that although safe and effective 17vaccines are available, thousands of children die or are hospitalized each year from diseases that 18 immunizations would prevent; and 19 Whereas the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians and 20 the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices have produced a list of recommended immu-21nizations; and 22Whereas the Department of Human Services has not amended its rules to take into account the 23recommended immunizations; now, therefore, Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon: 24 25That we, the members of the Seventy-fifth Legislative Assembly, direct the Department of Human Services to review its rules on immunization requirements and to ensure that the current im-26 munization requirements meet the requirements recommended by the American Academy of 27 Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians and the Advisory Committee on Immuniza-28tion Practices. 29 30
