Senate Finance and Revenue 76th Session EXHIBIT: My name is Janet Byrd. I'm the Executive Director of Neighborhood Partnerships, which convenes the Housing Alliance. The Housing Alliance is: a coalition of organizations from across the state that has come together out of a concern for those in our communities that do not have a safe. stable, and affordable place to call home, or access to a community that provides a range of opportunities and services. We know that we all benefit when our neighbors have full access to opportunity.

The Housing Alliance believes that maintaining a range of approaches and options that bring a variety of partners together to build and maintain affordable housing will help us create that opportunity. One critical tool for affordable housing development is tax exemption for housing that meets public policy goals, including density and proximity to transit.

SB 322 would extend the sunset on enabling legislation for locally controlled tax exemption programs from 2012 to 2022. By extending the sunset we'll keep an effective, efficient and useful tool to build affordable housing in place. SB 322 allows local governments to create incentives for multiple-unit housing development that serves a wide range of public purposes, including supporting mixed-use development and properties with orientation to transit, green building, allowing space for neighborhood focused retail such as grocery stores, and services such as child care.

The exemption for multi-unit housing in transit oriented districts lowers the operating costs for these housing projects, making development feasible. This small investment can help create healthy communities with a variety of housing plus services available for all residents.

This tax exemption is subject to local choice. This statute allows but does not require local taxing jurisdictions to adopt a property tax exemption program and to process requests for exemption for specific properties providing public benefits.

This tax exemption works. It produces public benefits for communities by encouraging the development of housing that meets defined public benefit goals. The housing developed through this tax exemption creates opportunities for families and communities, and allows local governments to better meet the needs of residents and create vibrant communities.
