Testimony for SB 1580

The Alliance of Culturally-Specific Behavioral Health Providers & Programs (The Alliance)

The Alliance is a group of culturally-specific (bicultural & bilingual) behavioral health providers and programs providing culturally and linguistically appropriate services to meet the special needs of the racially & ethnically diverse populations in Oregon including, but not limited to, African American, Asian, Hispanic, Native American and immigrants and refugees from Eastern Europe, Africa, and Middle Eastern countries. The racially & ethnically diverse consumers we serve suffer from serious mental illness diagnoses, including major depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, and psychosis. Major physical illnesses, such as diabetes and hypertension, create the need for complex medical care. Cultural and language barriers often exacerbate symptoms of their mental and physical illnesses. Recent and historical experiences of oppression, discrimination, and severe trauma significantly challenge their engagement in mainstream health care.

Our Goal for Health Care Transformation Efforts: <u>Be recognized as a key and active partner to implement strategic</u> <u>health care integration goals for racially and ethnically diverse populations.</u>

Request to Collaborate in Oregon's Health Transformation: The Alliance can be traced back over twelve years ago, when members were serving in the Cultural Competency Committee in Multnomah County, which was sponsored by former Senator Avel Gordly. The Alliance has been meeting since January 2011 to address possible impacts of HB3650. On May 20, 2011, the Alliance sent a request to Dr. Bruce Goldberg, M.D., Oregon Health Authority, to request an opportunity for collaboration: *"State recognizes the significant role and contribution of Cultural Specific Providers/Programs in the health care system for reducing health disparities and ensuring health equity for all Oregonians. State will work to assure the viability of the Cultural Specific Providers/Programs."* The Alliance is currently collaborating on workgroups and committees related to Health Care Transformation.

What the Alliance will specifically provide for Oregon's Health Care Transformation:

- 1. <u>Clear data and information</u> about the needs and successful approaches to health care for racially and ethnically diverse and refugee Consumers.
- 2. <u>A unique set of expertise and best practices</u> for implementing key health care integration goals for racially and ethnically diverse populations, i.e., utilizing culturally specific medical providers, psychiatrists, mental health professionals, A&D professionals, case managers and peer specialists.
- 3. <u>Significant experience and information on care for severe trauma</u> for racially, ethnically diverse, and refugee populations, including torture survivors.
- 4. <u>Outreach and training</u> for primary care and other providers working with ethnically and racially diverse and refugee populations
- 5. <u>Vital assistance in developing metrics</u> to evaluate models of care involving racially, ethnically diverse, and refugee populations
- 6. <u>A cost effective "Model of Care" to consider for all of the Tri-County Consumers</u>, which could engage consumers well, keep them in treatment, and produce good outcomes.

Evaluation Goals for Treatment Outcomes in the Alliance Programs: 1) Low Emergency Room Visits 2) Reduced Hospitalizations 3) High Percentage of Clinic Visits Kept 4) High Satisfaction Reports from our Consumers.
Evaluation Goals for Administration of the Alliance Programs: 1) Maintain culturally-competent leadership 2) Recruit and retain racially and ethnically diverse providers 3) Support education goals of racially and ethnically diverse individuals.

Position Statement from the Alliance: Cultivating "Triple -Win" Partnership in Health Care

- 1) State and County officials and health care partners working with Health Care Transformation in Oregon will continue to value and increase their knowledge about the importance and necessity of delivering culturally and linguistically competent health care to Medicaid Clients.
- 2) Officials and health care partners will recognize and support the very relevant, long experience of culturallyspecific behavioral health providers and programs in the Tri-County area which currently deliver effective care to racial and ethnic populations, many of which have long histories of huge health care disparities.

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- 3) Members of culturally and linguistically different populations, such as Native American, African American, Asian American, Latino/a American, immigrants and refugees from countries of Eastern Europe, Africa, and the Middle East have huge problems accessing, engaging in, and following through with health care. Culturally-specific behavioral health care providers and programs, which have the staff and other infrastructure in place to engage these target populations, can provide a vital bridge to these populations to help them understand, access, engage, feel comfortable with, and follow through with health care. A strong measure of success: Consumers are "strongly engaged and participate" in their own health care.
- 4) We strongly recommend integrating the culturally specific behavioral health providers and programs into plans for Oregon's Healthcare transformation to provide the continuum of care to racial and ethnic populations, closer linkages to primary care and reduce health inequity.
- 5) Culturally-specific providers and programs with clinical experience, cultural expertise working with these racial and ethnic populations can help reduce costs, produce reliable, relevant, possible metrics to measure progress of the health of our clients.
