AN ACT Relating to requiring businesses where food for human consumption is sold or served to allow persons with disabilities to bring their service animals onto the business premises; amending RCW 49.60.215; and adding a new section to chapter 49.60 RCW.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 **Sec. 1.** RCW 49.60.215 and 2009 c 164 s 2 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

(1) It shall be an unfair practice for any person or the person's 8 agent or employee to commit an act which directly or indirectly results 9 in any distinction, restriction, or discrimination, or the requiring of 10 any person to pay a larger sum than the uniform rates charged other 11 persons, or the refusing or withholding from any person the admission, 12 patronage, custom, presence, frequenting, dwelling, staying, or lodging 13 in any place of public resort, accommodation, assemblage, or amusement, 14 except for conditions and limitations established by law and applicable 15 to all persons, regardless of race, creed, color, national origin, 16 sexual orientation, sex, honorably discharged veteran or military 17 status, status as a mother breastfeeding her child, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability, or the use of a trained dog

quide or service animal by a person with a disability: PROVIDED, That 1 this section shall not be construed to require structural changes, modifications, or additions to make any place accessible to a person 3 with a disability except as otherwise required by law: PROVIDED, That 4 behavior or actions constituting a risk to property or other persons 5 can be grounds for refusal and shall not constitute an unfair practice. 6 (2) This section does not apply to food establishments, as defined 7 in section 2 of this act, with respect to the use of a trained dog 8 quide or service animal by a person with a disability. Food 9 establishments are subject to section 2 of this act with respect to 10 trained dog guides and service animals. 11

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 49.60 RCW 13 to read as follows:

(1) It shall be an unfair practice for any person or the person's 14 agent or employee to commit an act which directly or indirectly results 15 in any distinction, restriction, or discrimination, or the requiring of 16 any person to pay a larger sum than the uniform rates charged other 17 persons, or the refusing or withholding from any person the admission, 18 patronage, custom, presence, frequenting, dwelling, staying, or lodging in any food establishment, except for conditions and limitations _ J established by law and applicable to all persons, on the basis of the 21 use of a dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability: 22 PROVIDED, That this section shall not be construed to require 23 structural changes, modifications, or additions to make any place 24 accessible to a person with a disability except as otherwise required 25 by law: PROVIDED, That behavior or actions constituting a risk to 26 property or other persons can be grounds for refusal and shall not 27 constitute an unfair practice. 28

(2) A food establishment shall make reasonable modifications in 29 policies, practices, or procedures to permit the use of a miniature 30 horse by an individual with a disability in accordance with subsection 31 (1) of this section if the miniature horse has been individually 32 trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of the individual 33 with a disability. In determining whether reasonable modifications in 34 policies, practices, or procedures can be made to allow a miniature 35 horse into a facility, a food establishment shall act in accordance 36 with all applicable laws and regulations.

(3) For the purposes of this section:

(a) "Service animal" means any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a 3 disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, 4 or other mental disability. Except as provided in subsection (2) of 5 this section, other species of animals, whether wild or domestic, 6 trained or untrained, are not service animals. The work or tasks 7 performed by a service animal must be directly related to the 8 individual's disability. Examples of work or tasks include, but are 9 not limited to, assisting individuals who are blind or have low vision 10 with navigation and other tasks, alerting individuals who are deaf or 11 hard of hearing to the presence of people or sounds, providing 12 nonviolent protection or rescue work, pulling a wheelchair, assisting 13 an individual during a seizure, alerting individuals to the presence of 14 allergens, retrieving items such as medicine or the telephone, 15 providing physical support and assistance with balance and stability to 16 individuals with mobility disabilities, and helping persons with 17 psychiatric and neurological disabilities by preventing or interrupting 18 impulsive or destructive behaviors. The crime deterrent effects of an 19 animal's presence and the provision of emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship do not constitute work or tasks. 21

(b) "Food establishment" means a place of business that sells or serves food for human consumption with a North American industry classification system code within "445110," "445120," "445210," "445220," "445230," "445291," "445292," "445299," "452910," "722110," "722211," "722212," "722213," or "722410."
