Dear Co-Chairs Gilliam and Tomei and Members of the Committee:

On behalf of the Marion County Children and Families Commission and the communities served by commission members' work, I respectfully submit this testimony related to HB 4165, which is scheduled to be heard by the House Committee on Human Services at 3:00 pm February 8, 2012.

Marion County Children and Families Commission members generally feel that the local commission has been extremely effective in assisting children, youth and families achieve better outcomes by having the statutory authority to bring the right people to the table, ask tough questions, and develop innovative solutions that save money for taxpayers. Through our community-based strategies and investments we have safely reduced the numbers of children in foster care by 30% in four years, reduced the child abuse rate 29% in three years, and developed an innovative project to increase community literacy. As a result of that project and the hard work of educators and community members all over the county, 3rd and 8th grade reading scores are up and high school dropout rates are down. Our projects have been successful enough to attract impressive private investment over the last four years. That investment has allowed us to accelerate our impact to the extent that our local district attorney has called our commission a "force-multiplier."

Although you may hear some people argue that local commissions do not focus on achieving results, that is simply not the case. Most local commissions drive toward results and achieve, measure and report them regularly. Marion County is one of them.

For that reason, Marion County does <u>not</u> support the proposed elimination of funding for local commissions and programs on June 30, 2012.

Instead, Marion County Commission members believe that an additional year of funding (FY 2012-13) would be very important to allow local commissions the opportunity to assist in engineering a smooth transition for commission-funded programs so that any new system that evolves could take advantage, or build on, current success. Putting it more simply, although the bath water might need to be changed, it is not a good idea to throw the baby out with it.

Marion County would support an amendment to HB 4165 that would provide for funding for local commission operations and programs for FY 2012-13. This position is consistent with the position taken by the Association of Oregon Counties (AOC) and the Coalition of Local Commissions. It is my understanding that such an amendment is to be submitted by the Governor's Office.

For the record, Marion County is already implementing innovative changes to the way we do business in order to concentrate investment toward improving results for early learning, aligning early childhood outcomes with known kindergarten readiness indicators, and continuing to push literacy for children, youth, and adults. Our track record speaks for itself. Our goals are clear: we help families acquire the resources and skills they need to help their infants, toddlers, school-age children and youth be healthy and successful in school. When they are successful they have a greater likelihood of continuing their education post-high school, becoming employed, and becoming robust contributors to their communities and to Oregon's economy. Our community members and partners are invaluable allies in the effort to improve results, and we want to make sure the new model reflects those voices.
