WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Recognizes and honors achievements of Terri Jean Frohnmayer.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Quality of Ms. Frohnmayer’s success, after two decades’ absence from the game of golf

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: In a come from behind victory on September 15, 2011, Terri Jean Frohnmayer of Salem became the first Oregon woman to win the United States Golf Association’s (USGA) Senior Women's Amateur Championship, defeating defending champion Mina Hardin. After winning the title, she was named the 2011 Senior Women’s Player of the Year by the Pacific Northwest Golf Association, and the 2011 Golfer of the Year by the Oregon Golf Association. She was also recognized by the Marion County Board of Commissioners, with September 28, 2011 being designated “Terri Frohnmayer Day.”

Ms. Frohnmayer’s victory in 2011 marked the culmination of a successful athletic career that she began at age 13 years old. Her mother urged her to join the Mount Si High School boys’ golf team because the school did not have a girls’ golf team. She went on to play in the 1972 Washington State Women’s Public Links tournament; 1973 United States Girls’ Junior tournament; and 1974 Pacific Northwest Golf Association’s Women’s Amateur tournament. She left the game for 24 years before returning, again, with her mother’s encouragement, to compete in several tournaments, including the 2008, 2009 and 2010 Pacific Northwest Golf Association’s Senior Women’s Amateur tournaments, winning the 2010 tournament by nine strokes.

In addition to her success on the golf course, Ms. Frohnmayer is a successful small business owner, broker and real estate investor, and has served on a variety of boards and commissions, including President of the Salem Area Chamber of Commerce. Senate Concurrent Resolution 209A recognizes her achievements.
