Dear Chair and Members of the Committee,

The Deschutes Water Alliance is writing to express our support of HB 3358-1. The Deschutes Water Alliance (DWA) is a regional forum established in 2004 to address longterm water supply goals in the Deschutes Basin. Membership of the DWA includes the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs, the cities and counties of the Deschutes Basin, seven irrigation districts, private water companies and the Deschutes River Conservancy.

The Deschutes Basin has been at the forefront of implementing integrated water supply projects for over a decade. Through these collaborative efforts, we have made significant progress towards restoring stream flows and sustainably meeting existing and new water supply needs. This work is imperative because meeting these collective demands for water in the Deschutes Basin is essential to a strong Central Oregon economy.

Despite the progress made, much water supply work remains to be done in the Deschutes Basin. The Deschutes Basin stakeholders have already identified numerous projects that can result in thousands of acre-feet of water supply. However, before these projects can be implemented, a comprehensive integrated basin plan and related modeling effort must be completed to assure all stakeholders their interests will addressed. As a result, we have chosen to initiate a Bureau of Reclamation "Basin Study," starting in 2014. The end product will be a federal level programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) of the identified water supply projects that will be eligible for future federal, state and local implementation funding.

HB 3358-1 may provide a mechanism for Deschutes Basin stakeholders to obtain the necessary matching funds to complete the Bureau of Reclamation "Basin Study." In addition, the Governor's office, the Water Resources Department, and many of the key water stakeholders, have been developing SB 839-1, which is a "Water Supply Development" bill. In the meantime, HB 3358-1 should be preserved as a potential funding mechanism for the Deschutes Study.
