Managers predict 655,000 salmon <<u>http://wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/crc/</u>> will enter the Columbia this fall. To ensure enough protected fish reach spawning grounds, catch rates allocated 105,000 salmon for commercial and sport fishermen below Bonneville. Between Bonneville and McNary dams, tribal fishermen can catch up to 150,000 salmon.

That is 255,000 dead salmon not laying eggs.

Scientific studies on scour of Redds find less then significant.
