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## In Oregon (2011)

**12,994<sup>1</sup>**

Children spent at least one night in foster care

**10 of every 1000<sup>1, 2</sup>**

Children were in foster care on any given day (8,823<sup>1</sup>)

**5 of every 1000<sup>2</sup>**

National average of children in foster care on any given day

**Unknown**

What happens to these youth after they leave the system

**33<sup>rd</sup>**

## The Intercept Program

- Intensive in-home support
- Relentless focus on *permanent solutions*
- Assessment of every system that impacts family
- Ongoing safety plan reviews
- Seeing families average of 3 times per week

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## The Intercept Program

- On call 24/7
- Weekly supervision and treatment planning updates
- Coordination of multiple systems, including school
- Rigorous outcomes research
- Positive 3<sup>rd</sup> party reviews include:
  - ✓ Casey Family Programs: Common Knowledge Study
  - ✓ Harvard Business School
  - ✓ University of Chicago: Chapin Hall



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

### Oregon Intercept Demographics



Youth served through December 2012
