




## REDEMPTION CENTER STRUCTURE Wood Village / Oregon City




- > First two Bottle Drop Redemption Centers Wood Village & Oregon City
- > Center: Bottle Drop Redemption Center went from 144 to 200 daily limit
- > Red: Non-participating Retailers retained status quo (144 daily limit)
- ➤ Green: Allowed only retailers within a one and one-half (1.5) mile radius to participate.
- Tan: C-stores (less than 5KSF) remained at 50 daily limit

## Pilot Project in Salem (HB 3145 in 2011)



- Single Pilot Location in Salem
- > Center: Bottle Drop Redemption Center retained 300 daily limit
- ➤ **Red:** Non-participating retailers increased to 300 daily limit. Intended to provide level playing field between participating and non-participating retailers by requiring "similar services" requirement. OLCC could not enforce "similar" language.
- ➤ **Green:** Allowed retailers between the one and one half (1.5) and three (3) mile radius to participate on limited based in the Redemption Center retained return to retail (24 containers) in between the one and one half (1.5) and three (3) mile radii
- Tan: Reduced all C-stores (less than 5KSF) to 24 daily limit

## SB 117 (2013)



- Completion of OBRC Statewide Network (45 estimated locations) by 2018.
- Center: Redemption Center Capacity increases from a 300 unit to a 350 unit daily limit. Radii limits expand from 1.5 and 3.0 miles, to 2.0 and 3.5 miles.
- Red: Clarifies level playing field between participating and non-participating retailers by amending "similar services" to "equivalent services" specifically including hand counting (50), drop off service, and reverse vending machine (RVM) minimums
- Green: Retains return to retail at 24 containers in between the two (2.0) and three and one-half (3.5) mile radii
- Tan: Retains C-stores (less than 5KSF) at 24 daily limit
