I recently got to participate in a trip to Washington DC to meet Oregon's State Representative Suzanne Bonamici as part of the "Take our Daughters to Congress" program. I wanted to participate in this amazing, once-in-a-lifetime experience because I have never done anything like this before and I thought that I might not have this opportunity again. I knew going on this trip would provide me other opportunities to put my voice out in the world so others can hear it. This is really important to me.
