Oregon Opportunity Grants Eligibility Criteria

- <u>Oregon resident</u> who is also a US citizen or permanent resident (including out-of-state members of tribes with historical connections to Oregon).
- Attends <u>2- or 4-year public or private nonprofit institution</u> of higher education located and headquartered in Oregon.
- Is an <u>undergraduate</u> student who is enrolled <u>at least half time</u> (has no prior baccalaureate degrees).
- Has demonstrated <u>financial need</u>.
- Eligible for up to <u>equivalent of 4 years</u> (12 terms/8 semesters) of aid, at full-time enrollment; award prorated for half time.

OOG Award Formula (Uses Shared Responsibility Model)

Average Cost of Education (*public 2-yr & 4-yr*)

- (minus) Student share (work, loans, and/or scholarships)
 (minus) Family share (Expected Family Contribution)
 (minus) Federal share (Pell Grant and/or Tax Credit)
- = Unmet need

= Oregon Opportunity Grant (up to annual limit)

Oregon Opportunity Grant 2011-12 Statistics

- 344,658 Oregon residents who filed FAFSAs
- 290,045 undergraduate applicants
- 200,517 eligible applicants (met general eligibility criteria)
- 106,079 applicants who filed FAFSAs after 2/1/12
- 49,126 applicants awarded OOG
- 28,914 OOG recipients
- 18.6% of eligible applicants received OOG funds
- \$43.4 million disbursed to Oregon students

Oregon Opportunity Grant



Oregon Opportunity Grants *Key Performance Measure* #8

- Persistence rates over 4 years for students at 4-year institutions who are awarded an OOG vs. all applicants (2008-09 to 2011-12 cohort – % of firstyear students who apply for 4 consecutive years)
 - Goal = 73%
 - OOG = 79.6%
 - All applicants = 44.2%

Oregon Opportunity Grants Pickup Rates for 2011-12

Possible new Performance Measure

Total # Grants Awarded vs. # Grants Used

- 50.8% Community colleges
- 74.3% OUS Institutions
- 59.4% 4-year Private Nonprofits
- 58.9% Overall

Total Dollars Awarded vs. Dollars Used

- 35.8% Community colleges
- 66.8% OUS Institutions
- 55.9% 4-year Private Nonprofits
- 47.6% Overall

ASPIRE Statistics

- For 2011-12
 - 138 sites
 - 74,786 student participants
 - 1,543 volunteer mentors
 - Student-to-mentor ratio 5:1
- Projected Growth
 - 145 sites in 2012-13
 - 185 sites in 2013-14
 - 295 sites by end of 2013-15
