Five appointed members of the Oregon State Board of Education voted in May 2012 to ban use of the term "Indian," and any representation of an American Indian, as a name, nickname or symbol in all public schools in the state. Some Oregon legislators this year proposed laws to disallow unelected state officials from banning or regulating words or symbols used to identify Oregon schools.

If a majority of legislators can't agree to approve one of those laws, should Molalla River School District take some action to legally retain the name "Indians" and/or the ability to continue using the image of an American Indian?







Some estimates show that the district is likely to have to spend between \$300,000 and \$600,000 to eliminate all references and symbols relating to American Indians, and to develop and implement a new identity.
