Dear Chair Dembrow and Members of the Higher Education and Workforce Development Committee,

As the presidents of Oregon's public universities, we write in support of Tuition Equity legislation that would consider undocumented students to be Oregon residents for the purpose of determining tuition and fees at Oregon University System campuses. Many of these students have attended some or all of their K-12 education in the U.S., but due to the status of their parents, must pay out-of-state tuition at Oregon University System campuses.

Tuition Equity would grant in-state tuition to students who have lived in Oregon, attended Oregon schools, graduated from an Oregon high school, and been accepted to an Oregon University System institution, regardless of documentation status. This bill is an opportunity to reap the benefits of investments Oregon has already made in students throughout their K-12 education and move them along the educational continuum to help meet Oregon's 40-40-20 goals.

As we move out of the worst fiscal crisis in recent memory, the state cannot afford to leave Oregon students behind without the educational opportunities that will enable them to fully contribute to our state. Higher education is an investment in the civic, social, and economic health of Oregon and our institutions play a vital role in Oregon's economic development and social progress. Tuition Equity will enable us to provide access to an affordable, quality higher education to *all* qualified Oregon high school graduates.

Many students committed to education and who have excelled in their K-12 education through their own determination and focus, are also ready to succeed in postsecondary education. With postsecondary skills and training and a degree, these students can meet Oregon's workforce needs and contribute in positive and unique ways to our communities and our economy. If their only option is to pay nonresident tuition, which averages \$22,000 a year at OUS campuses, most if not all of these students will lack the resources to earn a college degree. The primary issue in determining student residency is one's intent to be permanently domiciled in Oregon. Students who will be affected by Tuition Equity fit this criterion, and are fully worthy of in-state tuition rates to Oregon University System schools.

Please support Tuition Equity legislation. All of us will reap the benefits of this investment in students who are Oregonians in every way except for society's label of them.

Chair Dembrow, Members of the committee,

For the record, my name is Caitlin Baggott. I am the Executive Director of the Bus Project. We work to engage young people and new people in democracy here in Oregon. We strongly urge you to support House Bill 2787, to bring Tuition Equity to Oregon and strengthen Oregon's economic future by ensuring a more educated population and keeping top achievers in our state.

This legislative session, perhaps more than any other in recent memory, we need to find ways to make Oregon as competitive as possible in the global economy. While this is unquestionably a pressing need today, its importance will continue to grow year after year. We should be planting seeds of innovation and prosperity today, so that Oregon's economy can grow more globally competitive in the coming decades.

We know that an educated workforce is one of the most critical elements of a state's businessfriendliness. It both attracts companies to our state and is a vital element of successful homegrown business. The recipe is simple: an educated Oregon is a competitive Oregon.

Oregon's students are extremely talented, but many pursue education out of state, potentially leaving Oregon permanently and reducing the attractiveness of our workforce. In-state tuition is one of the most fundamental things we can offer to talented students to keep them here, an investment to improve our economy and our quality of life. Without it, talented students simply have less incentive to attend Oregon institutions.

Without question, some of these talented students do not have documentation. Many have lived here nearly their entire lives, and had no choice in how they were brought here. They are working toward citizenship and, with a good Oregon education, can be a vital part of the new innovation economy. But because we do not offer these Oregonians in-state tuition, many either attend college out of state or opt out of college entirely. This does nothing but hurt Oregon's economy, today and especially in the future.

I would call Tuition Equity a great investment, except that investments cost money. Tuition Equity does not. Tuition Equity brings money into the state. Fiscal studies have found that Tuition Equity brings tuition dollars into a state's colleges and universities. This is because students eligible for Tuition Equity are not currently paying out-of-state tuition. They are not paying tuition to Oregon at all. Many are not attending college at all. That loses our state money and leads to further brain drain when we should instead be working to educate our state to compete with the rest of the world.



Tuition Equity is not simply an issue of basic fairness – although it is certainly that. It is a vital move to keep high achievers in Oregon and ensure our competitiveness in the real world.

The Bus Project strongly urges you to support House Bill 2787. Thank you very much for taking the time to review our letter of support for Tuition Equity.

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Testimony of David Rives President, American Federation of Teachers-Oregon

Hello, my name is David Rives, and as well as being the President of the American Federation of Teachers in Oregon, I am also an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) teacher at Portland Community College.

Let me begin by telling you a little about the American Federation of Teachers-Oregon. We represent 15,000 members across the state. Our members live in every legislative district in Oregon and work in the private and public sectors in elementary and high schools, child care centers, community colleges and four-year colleges and institutions, to health care clinics and hospitals. AFT members work as classified employees, faculty, instructors, graduate teachers, early educators and in health care professions. AFT-Oregon represents members at the University of Oregon, Portland State University, Oregon State University, Western Oregon University, and Eastern Oregon University. Nationally, of AFT's 1.5 million members, nearly 200,000 are higher education faculty, professional staff and graduate employees—more than any other national organization.

AFT-Oregon believes that Tuition Equity is the right thing to do for the youth of Oregon. We must expand educational opportunities to our youth who have grown up in Oregon and attended Oregon's Public Schools. Without Tuition Equity these students would be forced to pay out-of-state tuition at a rate three times higher than that of other Oregonians.

I teach a wide diversity of students in English for Speakers of Other Languages, they speak different first languages, are different ages, come from different backgrounds, and have different goals for using their English skills. These students share a strong drive to learn English and do better for both themselves and their families. Whenever a student tells me how they'd like to pursue a four-year degree, I am there to advise them on how to develop the necessary language and academic skills and to apply to a university. Sometimes I'll hear from a student that they can't apply to a university due to the high cost of out-of-state tuition and the unavailability of financial aid. I don't pry when the students' express these barriers to higher education, but it becomes apparent when I talk to them that it is because of their residency status. These young people with such high potential face a lifetime of limitations because they could not access higher education. We owe it to the youth of our society to help them reach their full potential.

Tuition Equity is the right thing to do for the future of Oregon.

Testimony of Becky Straus, Legislative Director In Support of HB 2787 House Committee on Higher Education and Workforce Development February 13, 2013

Chair Dembrow and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to express our support for HB 2787, which seeks to expand access to education for Oregon's high school graduates, regardless of where they were born or their current immigration status. Our organization has a proud history of advocating for the fair treatment of all persons here in Oregon. We support HB 2787 because it is an important step towards ensuring that Oregon's laws treat all students fairly.

A smart and fair improvement to benefit all of Oregon

All Oregonians deserve fair access to the high quality and affordable educational opportunities provided by the Oregon's colleges and universities. Ensuring that access substantially furthers principals of fundamental fairness. Students who will benefit from HB 2787 are, by and large, talented high-achievers who arrived in Oregon as children as the result of choices made by their parents. These students grew up in Oregon, they persevered against the odds to excel, they graduated from Oregon high schools, and they are otherwise eligible for admission to an Oregon college or university on equal terms with their friends and classmates. HB 2787 will modestly ensure that many students in Oregon who cannot prove lawful presence can nonetheless access the educational opportunities that they have already earned.

Furthermore, many of the undocumented students who stand to benefit from this bill are likely to become legal residents or American citizens under either current or future immigration laws. For this reason, denying these students access to an affordable college education is shortsighted. These students — who are our neighbors, our friends, and often our family members — are already an integral part of the Oregon community. There is an indisputably strong correlation between increased educational opportunities for young people and improved life chances in later years. And, having already established roots in Oregon, students who have graduated from Oregon high schools are likely to remain in the state upon graduating from an Oregon college or university and continue to contribute to this state's vibrancy.

It is time for Oregon to join the national trend toward Tuition Equity

To date, twelve states have laws allowing students who meet specific requirements, regardless of their status, to pay in-state tuition rates at public post-secondary institutions: California, Connecticut, Illinois, Kansas, Maryland, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Oklahoma, Texas, Utah, and Washington. Rhode Island's Board of Governors for Higher Education adopted a policy permitting eligible students to pay in-state tuition rates, regardless of their status. Minnesota offers a "flat" tuition rate to students, regardless of their status. New Mexico, Texas,

and California provide access to state financial aid to students who meet certain criteria, regardless of status. Illinois established a "DREAM" fund commission to raise money for scholarships to help children of immigrants.

2013 presents an opportunity for additional states to make similar progress, including Oregon. Colorado is likely to enact a tuition equity bill this year. Tuition equity bills also have been introduced in Indiana, Iowa, Massachusetts, Missouri, New Hampshire, and New Jersey. Similar bills are expected in Arkansas and Pennsylvania.

Bills in Connecticut and New York would provide access to state financial aid for eligible students regardless of status. Something similar is likely in Washington.

It is time for Oregon to move Tuition Equity forward. We request that you move HB 2787 to the House floor. Thank you for your consideration of this important issue. Please feel free to be in touch at any time with comments or questions.
