Subject: House Bill 2858

Co-Chair Bates, Co-Chair Nathanson and members of the committee,

My name is Lisa Grill Dodson. I am testifying today in my role as the Vice President of the Board of Directors of the Oregon Academy of Family Physicians and Director of the Oregon Area Health Education Center and the Oregon Rural Scholars Program **in favor of HB 2858**. OHSU also endorses this bill.

Meaningful access to health care in a reformed health care system will be impossible to achieve without an adequate supply of primary care providers, who act as points of entry into the health care system. There is without a doubt a shortage of physicians, nurses, physician assistants and other essential health care workers in rural and underserved communities throughout Oregon. The loan forgiveness program functions as an **effective strategy for recruiting Oregon students to attend Oregon universities, and remain in Oregon for practice**. This program is complementary to other "grow your own" pipeline strategies in effect by Oregon AHEC and others, and specifically incentivizes Oregon students.

Oregon does not educate enough health care providers in many key professions and is therefore a net importer of physicians and many other health professionals. Recruitment of these health professionals is now occurring in a national and even international marketplace, and **we must be competitive to secure the workforce needed to manage our healthcare transformation.** The data from a recent study by the Oregon Healthcare Workforce Institute indicates a loss of 313 primary care providers (7%) in the biennium ending December 211, as reported by Oregon's healthcare licensing boards <u>http://www.oregonhwi.org/resources/documents/Physicians2012ProfileBrief.</u>

This loss is expected to accelerate as the retirement of "baby boomer" health care workers accelerates in this decade, further exacerbating the recruitment problem. The reasons for this worsening shortage are numerous, including the accelerating retirement of an aging physician and nursing workforce, changes in medical school admissions and medical training, lifestyle choices and **rapidly rising student debt**.

The indebtedness of students during their training programs is reaching crisis proportions. Tuition costs at most Oregon training institutions are among the highest in the country. **OHSU medical students are graduating with a median debt medical school debt of more than \$170,000, with at least 10% of students in debt for more than \$250,000, not including debt from undergraduate or other education.** This level of indebtedness is forcing students to reconsider commitment to training in primary care, and to practicing in rural and underserved communities where their pay is substantially less. Regardless of their level of commitment, such training and practice becomes unfeasible when debt levels surpass the ability to reasonably repay them.

The current level of indebtedness threatens the social mission of our medical education system, undermines health reform efforts, and is counter to the increasing need for the robust primary care workforce needed to control medical costs and ensure access for all Oregonians. As you will see from the examples provided at the end of this testimony, **students graduating with current levels of indebtedness cannot reasonably be expected to manage their debt with the salaries expected for primary care physicians.** We have crossed the threshold where a student's good intentions are overcome by the reality of a life of indebtedness.

Students do not need to graduate debt free in order to enter primary care disciplines, and enter practices that care for rural and other underserved populations, but they do **need to have mechanisms that allow them to reduce their debt burden** to levels that allow them to make these choices. Students are increasingly finding that, due to their debt, they must choose higher paying, non-primary care disciplines that do not allow them to practice in smaller communities, or provide primary care services.

In the 2011 session, the legislature appropriated \$525,000 for Oregon's first state sponsored loan forgiveness program. In the last biennium this funding supported **10 students in rural training tracks, including MD, DNP and PA students.** Three programs currently qualify: OHSU MD, OHSU DNP and Pacific U PA. We anticipate the imminent development of a rural track at Western University COMP NW in Lebanon, and the Physician Assistant program at OHSU.

With the assistance of the Rural Loan Forgiveness program, each of these students may save as much as \$50,000-\$100,000 on interest alone, reduce their monthly loan payments by hundreds or even thousands of dollars, pay their loans off more than 10 years earlier, and be able to **reinvest the savings into their Oregon communities**. Even more importantly, it will allow them these students the **opportunity to choose primary care careers** and serve the primary care needs of their rural communities.

Re-funding the Rural Loan Forgiveness program is a **smart investment in our students, our communities, our economy and our healthcare system**. It provides an upfront benefit that significantly reduces loan payment costs and length of indebtedness, allows students to consider primary care careers, and enhances the social mission of medical education. I encourage you to continue to fund this valuable and cost effective program.

Quick Facts

The total number of active licensed physicians decreased by 2,285 between 2010 and 2012 while the number of active physicians reporting an Oregon practice address dropped by 313.

Two-thirds of Oregon's 36 counties experienced a reduction in the number of practicing physicians.

Between 2010 and 2012. there was a 7.8% drop (or -320) in the number of primary care physicians identifying a practice address in Oregon.

The average age of Oregon's physicians is 51 years. In 2010, 36% of the physician workforce was 55 years of age or older and in 2012, 39% were 55 years or older.

The percentage of females in Oregon's physician workforce increased from 31% in 2010 to 34% in 2012.

In 2012, 6% of Oregon's physicians reported plans to reduce practice hours, move out-of-state, or retire within in the next two years, compared to 5% who reported similar plans in 2010.
