We respectively request that you accept the responses below to questions asked during the Department's presentations – February 25-28.

Monday, February 25<sup>th</sup>

Overview:

1. How is it that Administration is leaner when you've gone from 113 to 120 positions?

A. The position reductions the Attorney General was referencing were the nine Administrative Services Division positions cut in package 090 in the 2011-13 budget. Operations affected by the reductions were: Financial Services, Human Resources, Facilities and Information Systems. This reduction of positions can be seen in the change between the 2009-11 budget at 118 positions and the 2011-13 Legislative Approved Budget at 109 positions. The Governor's Budget is at 113 positions.

Criminal Justice:

1. Were the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) forensic exams conducted by Department of Justice (DOJ) or the Oregon State Police?

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A. ICAC is a task force composed of multiple law enforcement agencies, led by DOJ. The number we reported to the committee does not include any exams that may have been conducted by the Oregon State Police.

2. What is the impact, if any, from the Federal Sequestration on their (DOJ) Domestic Violence work?

A. The work of the Domestic Violence prosecutor as referenced in our Criminal Justice presentation is not federally funded; therefore will not be impacted by the Federal Sequestration. The estimated impact on the Violence Against Women Grant this biennium is \$81,000 with an impact of \$341,859 next biennium. #### Tuesday, February 26<sup>th</sup>

Crime Victims:

1. What percentage of the District Attorney Victim Assistance Program (DA VAP) funding sent to the counties is used for administration costs?

A. County DA VAP's can spend up to 10% of grant funds for admin costs.

2. Who tracks and keeps child abuse trends and is child abuse on the rise or decline?

A. Every year, Department of Human Services (DHS) publishes their Child Welfare Data Book, which provides statistical and narrative information about children who are involved with the child welfare system due to abuse and neglect.

In terms of trends, the 2011 Data Book (the most recent version available) indicates that the total number of child abuse reports has increased steadily since 2002. In Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2011, DHS recorded 74,342 reports of concerns of child abuse/neglect, an increase in reporting of 2,456 from FFY 2010. Of these 74,342 reports, 32,328 were referred for investigation and of those cases investigated, 7,492 were founded for abuse/neglect. In 2010, out of 71,886 reports, 29,021 cases were referred for investigation, and of those, 7,306 were founded for abuse/neglect.

Per DHS data, child abuse trends are on the rise, even if only incrementally.

Through Child Assessment Multidisciplinary Intervention (CAMI) reporting, Crime Victims Services Division (CVSD) captures limited service data from Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDTs) and Child Abuse Intervention Centers. The data that CVSD receives also indicates rising abuse trends in terms of the number of victims

reported by MDTs and number of victims receiving evaluations from Child Abuse Intervention Centers.

3. What is the Return on Investment (ROI) on collections?

A. The ROI for collections in 2009-11 was 342%; where, the ROI for 2011-13 (through January) is 269%. In 2011-13, a third Revenue Agent was added. It is believed that the ROI for 2011-13 is lower than 2009-11 due to the added effort needed to collect incremental funds (e.g.: the easy collections were already being made), the training of the new Revenue Agent and the poor economy in general.

The money collected by the compensation revenue agents is used to pay for collection expenses, administrative costs and crime related benefits on behalf of victims. The money collected by the pilot project goes directly to the county courts. The courts then disperse the money (restitution) to crime victims. As directed by statute, for every dollar collected \$0.50 goes to the victim for court-ordered restitution and \$0.50 goes toward fines and fees.

Division of Child Support:

1. What is the limitation (dollar threshold) on employers per payroll period with respect to child support garnishments?

A. Within Oregon, income withholding for payment of child support obligations may not exceed 50% of the obligated party's net income. In some circumstances under certain criteria, the court, the Division of Child Support, or the district attorney, may order a withholding of more than 50%. A withholding that exceeds the 50% threshold is available only after the parties are granted due process. In no circumstance can the amount to be withheld exceed the limits imposed by the Consumer Credit Protection Act.

2. Does the Child Support Program receive complaints from employers stating that the cost (imposed on them by payroll processing companies) for processing a withholding order exceeds or is comparable to the amount of the withholding?

A. On rare occasions, Employer Services receives a complaint that the employer's labor cost, related to processing the withholding, exceeds or is comparable to the amount of the withholding. They stated that these complaints are received just one or two times a year.

#### Wednesday, February 27<sup>th</sup>

#### Chief Financial Office Analyst Overview:

1. Are attorney billed hours up?

A. Annual attorney billed hours expectations are subject to bargaining and have been set at 1,638 for a number of years.

The calculation for the hourly billing rate for attorneys is in essence simple. The hourly billing rate is set to equal the estimated expenses divided by the estimated total attorney hours to be billed. The 2013-15 pricelist rate of \$167 (up from \$143 for 2011-13 due primarily to increases in personal services costs) per hour for attorney time is currently being updated to reflect the PERS reductions taken in the Governor's Budget. In addition, we're currently working with Monica Brown, LFO Analyst, on other scenarios and will continue to revise rate(s) as changes are made to the Department of Justice's Legal Services Budget.

2. What is the ROI on the defense of the Master Settlement Agreement?

A. At risk in the current arbitration is Oregon's 2003 payment of \$65 million. Oregon's case specific hearing in the arbitration will be this April, with a ruling expected later in the year. If Oregon loses the arbitration, up to\$75 million may be deducted from the 2014 MSA payment. Approximately \$6.5 million has been spent on our arbitration case to date. If the State prevails the ROI will be around \$1 to \$12. But it is important to put that figure into the broader context of future arbitrations that will likely challenge the payments for 2004 and subsequent years. Those future arbitrations will be less costly for two reasons: (1) The costs should decrease in the future as much of the money was spent establishing the arbitration process itself and (2) the issues that will be resolved in this arbitration—the first of its kind under the MSA—will not have to be relitigated in future proceedings.

### Thursday, February 28, 2013

#### Civil Enforcement

1. Regarding Civil Recovery, how much has gone to agencies this biennium?

A. See attached spreadsheets for disbursements to agencies.

2. And, what are the number of registered charities, by year, since 2008; compared to how many law suits?

A. The number of charitable registrations from 2008 through 2012 are:

July 2008 -- 15,021 2009 -- 15,514 2010 -- 16,043 2011 -- 16,785 2012 -- 17,447

Regarding litigation: The Section seeks to avoid litigation when possible and resolves many matters by identifying corrective action that charities can take to address compliance issues. When the Section concludes that more formal action is necessary to protect the public from misleading solicitations or from misfeasance within a charitable organization, it generally pursues Assurances of Voluntary Compliance or similar stipulated agreements and typically enters into 12-15 such agreements every year. It has been relatively rare for the Section to fail to reach a settlement and to file a court complaint, but that occurs approximately 2-4 times a year. However, the litigation in which the Section is involved is increasingly complex and often involves unique factual situations. For example, the Section along with other litigants recently reached a settlement in the Sikh Dharma matter, which involved complicated questions of control and valuation of business holdings estimated to be worth more than \$100 million. Also, as charities take on an increasingly important role in their communities, the Section is increasingly being asked to intervene when problems arise that jeopardize charities' abilities to fulfill their missions.

Trial:

1. Of Trial's cases, what percentage are administrative hearings?

A. The Trial Division conducts administrative hearings for the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training and the State Hospital Review Panel. These administrative hearings composed about 7 percent of the new files opened this biennium for the Trial Division.

2. Do all the Department of Correction's facilities have law libraries?

A. Yes, in the form of computerized legal research materials. The majority of legal reference materials used by inmates are made available through computers, rather than hardbound books. But inmates at all Department of Corrections (ODOC) facilities have access to legal research through computer terminals. ODOC contracts with Westlaw and LexisNexis to provide legal research resources to inmates. The materials are on CD-ROMs; the inmate terminals are not connected to the internet or the staff intranet, for public safety reasons. Their resources include federal and state case law, Oregon statutes and administrative rules, American Law Reports, the United States Code Annotated, American Jurisprudence, Modern Scientific Evidence, and other sources.

3. Regarding Defense of Criminal Convictions (DCC), are we planning to adjust our Key Performance Measures (KPMs)?

A. DOJ was asked to construct KPMs for the DCC caseload. KPM#2 is a department-wide KPM. We decided to apply it to the Trial Division's DCC caseload because we thought that recent court rulings might require us to consider settlement as an option in some cases. That, however, has not been the case, as many post-conviction relief cases involve challenges for which the only real options are to uphold or vacate the original conviction - in other words, there is no room for a compromise. As a result, this KPM has not been particularly meaningful in illustrating the Department's effectiveness in defending criminal convictions. It is a more accurate measure for some caseloads than it is for others. The Department would like to exclude this caseload from the KPM. The Department would continue tracking and reporting separately for the DCC program on KPM#1 and KPM#16.

Administration:

1. What is the range of counsel's salaries and how many are there?

A. The current annual salary for attorneys and attorney managers ranges from \$65,580 to \$131,688 and there are presently 286.49 FTE budgeted for 2011-13.
