Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee, Thank you for listening to us today. My name is Heidi Smith, and I drove here this morning from Prineville along with two of my four sons.

I want to begin by saying how much I appreciate the American value, FREEDOM to choose, which has defined great Americans who have fought and died so that we can live in freedom in our state of Oregon and in my small town in Crook county.

I am here today to oppose SB 761 and 508. Am I reading it right when it says, "an emergency is declared to exist pertaining to SB 761 and the act is necessary for the immediate preservation of public peace, health, and safety?" Come on, you would think they were referring to public brick and mortar schools if they are going to declare a state of emergency, not virtual learning! We are parents who care about our children and their education, and we have chosen a sound program with state certified instructors. ORVA works because it is education driven without a lot of unnecessary distractions.

We love ORVA because the teachers are involved and accessible in a way that makes the system work well! Without feeling left in the dark, parents can closely work with their teachers to help our kids reach their goals. We are able to know exactly what our children are being taught.
