House Bill 2641

Sponsored by Representative WILLIAMSON; Representatives BUCKLEY, CLEM, DOHERTY, GREENLICK, HOLVEY, KOMP, NATHANSON, WITT, Senators MONROE, ROBLAN (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Prohibits school districts from entering into contract with entity that is for-profit entity unless contract is for good or service that is provided only by for-profit entities. Prohibits school districts from awarding contracts for goods or services without competition.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 332.075 is amended to read:

6 332.075. (1) Any district school board may:

7 (a) Fix the days of the year and the hours of the day when schools shall be in session.

8 (b) Adopt textbooks and other instructional materials as provided in ORS 337.120 and 337.141
9 and courses of study for the use of such schools as provided in ORS 336.035.

(c) Authorize the use of the schools for purposes of training students of an approved teacher education institution, as defined in ORS 342.120, and for such purposes may enter into contracts with the approved teacher education institutions on such terms as may be agreed upon. Such contracts as they relate to student teachers shall have the same effect and be subject to the same regulations as a contract between a licensed teacher and a district school board.

(d) Develop and operate with other school districts or community college districts secondary career and technical education programs for pupils of more than one district and fix by agreement the duration of the district's obligation to continue such activity, subject to the availability of funds therefor.

(e) Authorize the school district to be a member of and pay fees, if any, to any voluntary or ganization that administers interscholastic activities or that facilitates the scheduling and pro gramming of interscholastic activities.

(f) Accept money or property donated for the use or benefit of the school district and, consistent with the laws of this state, use such money or property for the purpose for which it was donated.

(A) Approved by the district school board before an order can be drawn for payment.

(b) If a contract is made without the authority of the district school board, the individual mak-ing such contract shall be personally liable.

(1) A contracting agency, other than a school district, may award a contract for goods or services without competition when the Director of the Oregon Department of Administra-23tive Services, the local contract review board or a state contracting agency, if it has procurement 24 authority under ORS 279A.050, or a person designated in writing by the director, board or state 25contracting agency with procurement authority under ORS 279A.050, determines in writing, in ac-2627cordance with rules adopted under ORS 279A.065, that the goods or services, or class of goods or services, are available from only one source. 28

(2) The determination of a sole source must be based on written findings that may include:

30 (a) That the efficient utilization of existing goods requires the acquisition of compatible goods 31 or services;

32(b) That the goods or services required for the exchange of software or data with other public or private agencies are available from only one source; 33

34 (c) That the goods or services are for use in a pilot or an experimental project; or

35 (d) Other findings that support the conclusion that the goods or services are available from only 36 one source.

37 (3) To the extent reasonably practical, the contracting agency shall negotiate with the sole 38 source to obtain contract terms advantageous to the contracting agency.

SECTION 5. ORS 279B.085 is amended to read: 39

279B.085. (1) As used in this section and ORS 279B.400: 40

(a) "Class special procurement" means a contracting procedure that differs from the procedures 41 described in ORS 279B.055, 279B.060, 279B.065 and 279B.070 and is for the purpose of entering into 42 a series of contracts over time or for multiple projects. 43

(b) "Contract-specific special procurement" means a contracting procedure that differs from the 44 procedures described in ORS 279B.055, 279B.060, 279B.065 and 279B.070 and is for the purpose of 45

entering into a single contract or a number of related contracts on a one-time basis or for a single
 project.

3 (c) "Special procurement" means, unless the context requires otherwise, a class special pro 4 curement, a contract-specific special procurement or both.

5 (2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, to seek approval of a special procure-6 ment, a contracting agency shall submit a written request to the Director of the Oregon Department 7 of Administrative Services or the local contract review board, as applicable, that describes the 8 contracting procedure, the goods or services or the class of goods or services that are the subject 9 of the special procurement and the circumstances that justify the use of a special procurement under 10 the standards set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

(3)(a) When the contracting agency is the office of the Secretary of State or the office of the State Treasurer, to seek approval of a special procurement, the contracting agency shall submit a written request to the Secretary of State or the State Treasurer, as applicable, that describes the contracting procedure, the goods or services or the class of goods or services that are the subject of the special procurement and the circumstances that justify the use of a special procurement under the standards set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

(b) A contracting agency that is a school district may not seek approval of a special
 procurement or award a contract through special procurement as provided by this section.

(4) The director, a local contract review board, the Secretary of State or the State Treasurer may approve a special procurement if the director, board, Secretary of State or State Treasurer finds that a written request submitted under subsection (2) or (3)(a) of this section demonstrates that the use of a special procurement as described in the request, or an alternative procedure prescribed by the director, board, Secretary of State or State Treasurer:

(a) Is unlikely to encourage favoritism in the awarding of public contracts or to substantially
 diminish competition for public contracts; and

(b)(A) Is reasonably expected to result in substantial cost savings to the contracting agency or
 to the public; or

(B) Otherwise substantially promotes the public interest in a manner that could not practicably
be realized by complying with requirements that are applicable under ORS 279B.055, 279B.060,
279B.065 or 279B.070 or under any rules adopted thereunder.

(5) Public notice of the approval of a special procurement must be given in the same manner
 as provided in ORS 279B.055 (4).

(6) If a contracting agency intends to award a contract through a special procurement that calls
 for competition among prospective contractors, the contracting agency shall award the contract to
 the offeror the contracting agency determines to be the most advantageous to the contracting
 agency.

(7) When the director, a local contract review board, the Secretary of State or the State Treasurer approves a class special procurement under this section, the contracting agency may award contracts to acquire goods or services within the class of goods or services in accordance with the terms of the approval without making a subsequent request for a special procurement.
