- Intervene sooner, avoiding costs associated with child welfare, recidivism, juvenile detention, and state residential commitment.

Marion County is home to four of fourteen state correctional facilities, two state juvenile corrections facilities, and the Oregon State Hospital. Our county population of state and local inmates is the highest per capita rate of any Oregon county. The Marion County Sheriff's Office operates the third largest jail in Oregon. Marion County also has the state's second largest Hispanic population and the largest number of Hispanic youth in the juvenile justice system. These factors influence the social conditions for families in our communities. House Bill 2031 will help Marion County improve the lives of families and youth, paving the way for other counties to do the same.

We urge the committee to support House Bill 2031.
