OPPORTUNITY GRANT REDESIGN -TIMELINE

November 2013 - OEIB directs HECC to convene State Financial Aid Work Group to study structure for state financial aid and Oregon Opportunity Grant, with the following goal:

To recommend a restructured Oregon Opportunity Grant program that will both achieve the goal of improving access to higher education and vocational and technical education for promising, financially-needy underrepresented students, and stimulate the achievement of the State of Oregon's 40-40-20 goals.

WORKING GROUP RECOMMENDATIONS

- Restructure the Grant to serve the most financially needy students.
- Within these students, prioritize funding for students from underrepresented racial and ethnic groups;
- Adopt requirements of student academic progress and achievement for renewal eligibility;
- Endorse predictability by guaranteeing awards for the first two years, if renewal eligibility requirements are met
- Eliminate "first come-first served" and award grants on a rolling application basis;



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WORKING GROUP RECOMMENDATIONS – CONTINUED

- Pursue additional funding to more fully meet current and future financial need;
- Establish an implementation team to develop an implementation plan and timeline to transition the Oregon Opportunity Grant, consistent with the recommendations proposed by the Work Group; and
- Recommend to the HECC and OEIB to consider, separately from the OOG recommendations, a "pipeline affordability commitment" for K-12 low-income students.



DESIGN TEAM RECOMMENDATIONS

- Prioritize awarding an Oregon Opportunity Grant (OOG) to qualified students with the highest financial need or whose circumstances would enhance the promotion of HECC-adopted equity guidelines.
 - Award maximum OOG to students who have an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) of \$0 and meet Federal Pell Grant eligibility requirements.
 - If funds are available, award grants to students with EFCs up to \$500, then to those with EFCs up to \$1,000, and so on.



DESIGN TEAM RECOMMENDATIONS – CONTINUED

- Increase access for new applicants by setting a later OOG application deadline, potentially as late as August. (Deadline has been February 1 for three or more years.)
- Guarantee OOG for second year of attendance, provided students meet all of the following criteria for renewal:
 - Maintain satisfactory academic progress
 - Apply for renewal timely each year
 - Continue to meet other eligibility criteria



TUITION PROMISE CONCEPT

- HECC may establish a supplemental award to reward persistence and completion.
- HECC may establish eligibility criteria for supplemental award by rule.
- Supplemental award based on 3-year average of tuition increases or similar measure.
