Nationally, TANF has weakened as a safety net for poor families

TANF's* Role as a Safety Net Has Declined Sharply Over Time



Number of families receiving AFDC/TANF benefits for every 100 families with children in poverty

Oregon's TANF caseload responded significantly to increased need during the recession – one of the best responses in the county





TANF benefits in most states leave families far below the poverty line

Maximum TANF* Benefits Leave Families Well Below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)



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The value of benefits has declined by 27% in Oregon since 1996

TANF* Benefits in Most States Have Declined in Value Since 1996



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Oregon's grant levels are among the top 20 in the country, but they only bring families to 30.7% percent of the poverty line









Safety net

- Access to and adequacy of benefits to provide stability for children's positive growth and development
- Time limits do not deny families aid when they are unable to work because of individual circumstances or economic conditions.
- Assistance does not immediately end when a parent finds a job
 - eligibility exit levels
 - transitional supports



Principles for TANF Program Proposals (continued)

Work-related programs

- Recognizing the diversity of the caseload, TANF supports multiple pathways to work including array of education and training programs that can lead to higher-paying and more stable jobs.
- Individual expectations are realistic, taking into account strengths, goals and employment barriers.
- The program is flexible enough to adapt to changes in and respond to the realities of local labor markets.
