

TRUs Overview: Who we are

- Serve over 20,000 students—82% of whom are Oregonians
- Most TRU students require need-based aid and come from rural and/or distressed communities
- Have 50-60% of students who are first generation
- Awarded 3,079 bachelor's degrees and 535 master's degrees in 2014
- Have a combined Public University Support Fund appropriation of approximately \$140M for 2013-15







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Changes: Where we're at now

- Change in Governance system: institutional boards
 - Take effect July 1, 2015
 - Already meeting and engaged
- Unbundling of the Oregon University System
 - Working through technical issues, cost shifts
 - Concerns about transition costs
 - Collaborating and sharing services
- Ensuring financial viability/sustainability, and quality, relevant degrees for long-term student success











What our students need to succeed

- Full funding for the Public University Support Fund
- Balance of new aid with campus supports to ensure retention and degree outcomes
- Transition support for Operational costs for Shared Services to ensure successful system transition
- Sports Lottery
- Capital projects

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

- Top school in Pacific NW in added value of degree (2014)




Leading Oregon into the future

- Applied Baccalaureate Programs for adult learners
- Active partner in Willamette Promise dual credit effort (2014)
- Bilingual Teacher Initiative with Hillsboro and Salem Keizer
- Student Enrichment Program supporting low-income, firstgeneration or students with disabilities.

Affordability supporting student success

- Western's Tuition Promise established in 2007, freezes tuition for four years
- Textbook Rental Program saved students more than \$1 million since 2012
- MAPS Credit Union Peer Mentors focused on increasing student financial literacy

EOU Plans

With increased investment from the State, EOU would focus on serving unmet needs to support students and achieve 40/40/20:

- Eastern Oregon Advantage for on-time, cost-managed graduation and support.
- Outreach and education for Latino and under-served populations
- Eagle Cap College Center provides access to needed courses in rural schools throughout the region and state.
- EOU's Center for Rural Studies connects community and regional needs with student and faculty research.
- EOU Regional Centers deliver community college connections to adults where they live.

With increased investment from the State, SOU would focus on three primary strategic objectives to support students and achieve 40/40/20.

- Recruitment of rural, first generation, and other underrepresented populations within our region by creating a stronger link between SOU and high schools in the region.
- Persistence from year one to year two for all students.
- Support for students to complete their studies so they will be wellprepared to fill both regional and state employment requirements.











Oregon Tech Points of Distinction

- Pacific Northwest's only polytechnic university
- STEM focus: innovative and rigorous applied degree programs in engineering, health technologies, management, arts and sciences
- Small, hands-on learning environment, focusing on application of theory to practice
- High starting salaries and graduate success; highest ROI in Oregon
- Most diverse student body in Oregon Tech history = 27% students of color
- Strong presence in both rural and suburban Oregon
- Meeting Oregon's workforce needs for high-demand occupations







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Oregon Tech Plans

- Add 5 new academic programs to respond to industry needs
- Double the number of online students through technology-enabled learning programs and technical platforms
- Reach many more students with expanded student success services
 (retention outreach, tutoring, mentoring, college success classes) for first-generation, low-income and students with disabilities
- Increase graduation rates with Early Intervention Alert program for students struggling academically and provide increased supplemental instruction
- Expand STEM Hub activities in collaboration with school districts, colleges, businesses and community partners, including outreach to underrepresented students
- Manage through the downturns with fiscal prudence and planning
