

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

■ Preventing hunger ■ Improving health ■ Providing nutrition education ■ Boosting local economies

SNAP, formerly known as Food Stamps, is a national program that helps bridge the gap for people who are unemployed or earn too little to meet their basic nutrition needs. SNAP benefits are provided monthly to participants via an electronic debit card called the Oregon Trail Card. SNAP benefits can only be used to purchase food from authorized food retailers. SNAP benefits cannot be used to buy non-food items such as alcoholic beverages, cigarettes, medicine, pet food or household products. The food benefits issued to clients are 100% federally funded. The U.S. Department of Agriculture authorizes and monitors retailers that accept SNAP benefits.

Fast Facts About SNAP

- ▶ 1 in 5 Oregonians participate in SNAP
- ▶ The SNAP caseload is 63% higher than it was before the recession
- ▶ Nearly 36% of participants are children
- ▶ 45% of households include a child or elderly person
- ▶ More than 50% of participants are between the ages of 18 and 59
- ► Seniors are the fastest growing category of participants
- ▶ Nutrition education efforts touched 387,800 people in 2014
- ▶ 21,600 participated in the employment and training program in 2014

Performance Awards

Oregon has received national recognition seven years in a row for effective administration of SNAP. Oregon has been a national leader for the timeliness of application processing, participation and accuracy. The performance awards, from the USDA, come with cash bonuses that have been used to off-set budget cuts to preserve important state programs.
