Oregon's historic downtowns are the cultural and economic cores of her communities. Property owners, members of chambers of commerce, downtown business owners' associations, our elected and appointed officials, city government staff and others in the historic preservation community work tirelessly to bring these districts back to life. Very often the cost of much-needed building restoration and compliance with local and state codes, when combined with the cost of seismic retrofitting, puts improvements out of the reach of many property owners and means that not only are the cultural and economic cores of our communities neglected but the likelihood of their surviving the eventual earthquake we hear so much about lately is jeopardized.

While I'm writing you on my own behalf, I've worked for the City of Ashland since 1996 staffing numerous commissions including the Historic Commission and working as a municipal land use planner while administering Certified Local Government Grants and working with the Oregon State Historic Preservation Office. I've seen the incredible commitment, energy and dedication that volunteer commissioners bring to issues of preservation, but I've also seen that getting a property owner to do the right thing is only possible if they can afford to do so. And when they can afford it, we get projects like the once-neglected Ashland Springs Hotel on Ashland's Main Street or the newly-restored Sparta Building on Main Street in downtown Medford that can turn a whole district around.

With this in mind, I urge you to support and advocate for **The Revitalize Main Street Act** (SB 565) as a modest, cost-effective investment that will help revitalize Oregon's downtowns and pay dividends for decades to come in the form of new jobs, income and property taxes, cultural heritage and tourism, business incubation, seismic safety, and the reuse of existing infrastructure. # RE: Testimony in support of SB 565, The Revitalize Main Street Act

Dear Chairman Hass, Vice-Chair Boquist, and members of the Committee:

Good morning. I am Peggy Sigler, Oregon Field Officer for the National Trust for Historic Preservation. On behalf of the 1800 Oregon members of the National Trust, I thank you for the opportunity to provide a national perspective on the proposed economic development program for Oregon's historic buildings.

Over the past 20 years, the National Trust has helped 35 states create tax incentives for historic rehab. These programs attract private investment to restore historic properties that likely would otherwise be demolished. Time and again, these now-appealing properties revitalize Main Streets, downtowns, and older communities.

**Historic tax credits are a public-private investment and job creation strategy** with great potential for increased private investment in communities throughout Oregon. A study of Ohio's historic tax credit program found that every \$1 million invested by the state resulted in \$8 million in construction spending, and \$32 million in total operating impact, with a total of 381 jobs.

**State historic tax credits leverage federal investment,** spurring more rehabilitation. States with high-performing tax credit programs bring \$3 to \$7 million in federal tax credits back to those states each year. An economic impact study of Bill565 estimates that redevelopment would double with a net increase of more than \$13 million to Oregon.

And historic rehab creates more jobs. According to researcher Donovan Rypkema, historic rehab creates 5.7 more jobs than manufacturing and 2 more jobs than new construction for every \$1 million spent, because it is labor intensive. Costs of rehabilitation are typically two-thirds labor and one-third materials, while new construction is about half and half. Labor and materials, often sustainable, for historic rehabs tend to be hired and purchased locally.

Historic tax credits are a critical reinvestment tool that revitalizes local communities, putting vacant and underperforming buildings back on property tax rolls. In Wisconsin, 60% of that state's historic tax credit projects in 2014 were for buildings that were vacant prior to renovation.

Historic tax credit projects act as a catalyst for redevelopment. In rural Evansville, Wisconsin (Pop. 5100), the renovation of a 1907 commercial building spurred the rehab of an adjacent 1870 retail building, which inspired three more historic improvement projects on the same block on Main Street.

I urge you to support **The Revitalize Main Street Act (SB 565)**, attracting private and federal reinvestment dollars to abandoned and under-utilized buildings in Oregon's historic downtowns and commercial areas, enhancing vibrant, thriving communities throughout our state.

Downtown Astoria, as well as many other small towns, has many examples of buildings in need of restoration but lacking adequate economic resources.

The Revitalize Main Street Act (SB 565) is a modest, cost-effective investment that will help revitalize our downtowns and pay dividends for decades to come in the form of new jobs, income and property taxes, cultural heritage and tourism, business incubation, seismic safety, and the reuse of existing infrastructure. The Revitalize Main Street Act creates a state Historic Rehabilitation Fund to provide a 25% rebate for the certified rehabilitation of historic commercial buildings – stores, hotels, theaters, apartments, factories, mills, etc. It would be funded by the public auction of state income tax credits (similar to the Oregon Film Production Credit) at a capped amount of \$12M per year. The money stays here in Oregon and we end up with long term, tangible assets. An economic impact study conducted by EcoNorthwest states that Oregon would be economically better off with this incentive. Historic rehabilitation incentives have been proven effective in 35 other states as a targeted means to attract private investment and capture more federal tax credit dollars. This is particularly important in smaller towns.

I urge you to support and advocate for The Revitalize Main Street Act (SB 565).
