#### HB 2955

#### **Support Increased Civic Education for Teachers**

At the close of the constitutional convention in 1787, Benjamin Franklin was asked, "what have we got, a republic or a monarchy?" ...

WHAT HB 2955 amends ORS 336.029, which created a statewide Civics Day for teachers, to add money so that teachers from every district can attend a statewide civics conference and receive follow-up classroom support.

#### WHY

#### Civic education needs shoring up.

- Mandatory testing in public schools shifted resources to math and literacy. Social studies teachers and Oregon students have suffered as a result.
- Oregon's system of frequent referrals and initiatives makes citizens into lawmakers. Oregon needs more high-quality civic education to support future informed voters.

#### WHY THIS HB 2955 builds on a

HB 2955 builds on an existing, successful infrastructure.

- Civics Day for Teachers is celebrated annually by a civics conference for educators. Now in its 8<sup>th</sup> year, the conference is put on by Classroom Law Project, an Oregon non-profit organization that is a nationally recognized leader in civic education.
- The conference is held at the State Capitol and Supreme Court buildings with sessions in capitol hearing rooms and the Senate Chambers. For many teachers, it is their first time at the capitol.
- Workshops are led by elected officials, master teachers, and other civic leaders. Teachers value a professional development day rich in content, strategies, and inspiration. They can immediately use what they learn to teach Oregon students.
- Every branch and both parties are represented. Past speakers have included then-Secretary Kate Brown, Chief Justice Tom Balmer, General Ellen Rosenblum, Senator Jackie Winters, Representative Jeff Kruse, and Representative Jennifer Williamson (this represents a small sample). Teachers meet government leaders and bring their message back to classrooms.

**EVERY DISTRICT BENEFITS** Two teachers from **every legislative district** may receive grants to attend the Conference and receive follow-up support.

With fewer resources devoted to social studies, this bill helps close the gap. It funds two
teachers from every legislative district to attend the Conference and receive follow-up
support. It is an equitable distribution of funds across the state.

**FUNDING** HB 2955 directs \$200,000 per biennium to fund grants for 180 teachers (two teachers from every House and Senate district) annually to both attend the conference and receive follow-up support.


