SUBJECT: SB 416, Imposition of Fees on Entities Subject to the Oregon Indoor Clean Air Act

Chair Monnes Anderson and members of the committee; I am Karen Girard, the Health Promotion and Chronic Disease Prevention Manager for the Oregon Health Authority.

I am here today to present information related to SB 416, concerning the imposition of fees on entities subject to the Oregon Indoor Clean Air Act.

Oregon's Smokefree Workplace Law protects nearly every Oregon employee from the health risks of secondhand smoke by prohibiting smoking in most public places and workplaces. There are a few exceptions that continue to expose Oregonians to secondhand smoke. Exemptions to the law include certified smoke shops and cigar bars.

Cigar bars and smoke shops do not pay a fee to cover the costs of certification or re-certification. Instead, the cost of certification is funded using funds dedicated for tobacco prevention and education by the 1996 Ballot Measure 44.

Administering the certification process requires staff time to respond to smoke shop inquiries, answer questions from potential smoke shop owners, and follow up with applicants during the application review process. There are also legal costs for clarifying rules and responding to legal challenges brought by businesses that are denied certification. The process for smoke shop certification also includes creating training and educational materials for local tobacco prevention coordinators who inspect these smoke shops annually.

This bill requires the Oregon Health Authority to impose a reasonable fee to cover the costs of smoke shop certification. As currently written, the Public Health Division has no concerns with SB 416 and can calculate the costs associated with smoke shop certification based on prior experience.
