My name is Kurt Tripp. I & my wife, Francine are the founders of Ivory Jacks. I represent our Washington State business of 36 years, my wife, myself & our family as well as the thousands of American citizens that benefit from the use of Prehistoric Woolly Mammoth ivory. I am against the passage of SB913.

We are not involved in any illegal ivory trade as described in SB913! All materials we use were legally obtained! I resent the characterization that any one that has Mammoth ivory is in some way, automatically a criminal trying to deceive innocent consumers.

Prehistoric Woolly mammoth ivory is found by chance by Aboriginal subsistence hunter, gatherer inhabitants of remote Alaskan and Russian regions. It is also a byproduct of mining operations dotted throughout Alaska and Northern Canada.

Prehistoric Woolly Mammoth ivory is found only by chance in the soils of God's earth. Jobs are scarce in the thousands of remote villages where we purchase our materials.
