Larry Nicholson Oregon Senate Hearing, March 23, 2014

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak with you today about these bills. Today you're going to hear some rhetoric from a few folks organized by one Klamath County Commissioner who's on a personal mission to derail the Klamath agreements. How do I know its rhetoric? Because up until a couple years ago, I too was standing shoulder to shoulder with him, opposing these agreements. We used many of the same arguments you'll hear today to oppose these agreements back then, most of which have been answered to the satisfaction of most reasonable thinking people. The Klamath Settlement Agreements as a package now have a majority of Klamath County farmers and ranchers who support it. So what changed?

Most of us primarily opposed the Klamath Agreements because it left out the offproject irrigators. We too wanted assurances that we would receive water in order to plan and manage our farms and ranches. I realized that in order to resolve this complex issue and become part of the solution instead of the problem, I had to take a different approach.

About two years ago, our Governor, Senator's Wyden and Merkley, along with Congressman Walden, asked all affected parties to return to the table and work out our differences. I was one of several irrigators trying to find solutions to all the complex issues. After several months of negotiations with the Klamath tribes, along with several other stakeholders, we agreed on the final piece of the puzzle and created what's called the Upper Klamath Basin Comprehensive Agreement. There are now three agreements that all work in conjunction with one another to resolve one of the most contentious issues impacting our region. For the first time, you have the vast majority of all the stakeholders from the top of the tributaries in Southern Oregon the way to the sea in Northern California who have agreed on how to share water. These agreements take into account the needs of the tribes, farmers, ranchers, water quality, fish, and fisherman. Think about that!! This could easily become a model for the nation on how to share what's becoming one of the scarcest precious resources we have today, water!

After these meetings, we spoke about the structure of these agreements to different organizations and groups around the county and got additional endorsements from the Klamath County Farm Bureau, The Klamath County Cattlemen's Assc, The Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, The Family Farm Alliance, The City of Klamath Falls, along with the Oregon Farm Bureau and the Oregon Cattlemen's Assc. We continue to have support from the Klamath, Karuk, and Yurok tribes and most every Oregon irrigation district in the Klamath watershed. We have a long list of large group supporters including the U.S. government, tribes, agriculture, business and community organizations, sportsman and conservation groups, commercial and sport fishing industry, and newspapers.

So, why are we all here today? What you're being asked to vote on will not restore any steams, or help salmon get up those streams. It's not going to give ranchers or farmers any assurances they'll have water to irrigate from year to year and it certainly will not guaranty good water quality for fish in the rivers. Those jobs are for all the hundreds of sincere, hard-working, intelligent folks who have been working hard to put all the pieces to these agreements together for the past decade. What we're asking of you: Allow us to continue this journey so we can put all the pieces together and find solutions. This is a process. There is a lot of work to do before we can declare success. We need the state of Oregon able to join us and help guide us to success. There will be bumps in the road and changes along the way to accommodate unforeseen circumstances as we move forward. I urge you to vote for SB 264 \$ 206 and allow us to continue to work through all the issues to an acceptable resolution for all.
