The Campaign Urges Support for Elder Abuse Resource Prosecutor

The Campaign for Oregon Seniors and People with Disabilities supports the Oregon Department of Justice's proposal for an Elder Abuse Resource Prosecutor. We believe this Prosecutor will lead to improved enforcement of the laws that protect some of our most vulnerable citizens.

Elder abuse is a very serious issue in Oregon. Every year an estimated 2.1 million older Americans are victims of elder abuse, neglect, or exploitation. About 30,000 reports of potential abuse were made in 2013 in Oregon. That may just be the tip of the iceberg, as experts believe that for every case of elder abuse or neglect reported, as many as five cases go unreported.

Elder abuse cases are often more challenging for prosecutors, as the victims often have relationships with the person perpetrating the crimes. That frequently leads to a reluctance to report abuse, a reluctance to cooperate with investigations, and often even prevents the recognition that they are being abused. As these issues are so complicated, having expertise in the DOJ to assist with prosecuting these cases will help local prosecutors perform their jobs more effectively.
