Oregon Domestic & Sexual Violence Services Fund (ODSVS) \$10 MILLION in the ODSVS FUND IN DOJ BUDGET (SB 5516)

ODSVS DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE SERVICES ARE LIFELINES TO OREGONIANS:

- ODSVS funds emergency shelter, expert safety planning, counseling, and other support services to victims fleeing domestic and sexual violence in every county across the state.
- Access to these services reduces the incidence of re-assault by 70%.
- ODSVS is the only source of general fund support for these services; currently funded at \$8.4 million for the biennium. Total state and federal funding available in Oregon meets less than half the minimum core emergency need.

THE NEED IS GREAT ACROSS THE STATE:

- In 2013, domestic violence programs responded to more than 140,600 calls for help. There were almost 12,000 requests for emergency shelter that could not be met
- 44 percent of those in shelter were under 18 years of age.
- More than 85,000 Oregon women report having been physically or sexually assaulted by an intimate or recently intimate partner in the last 5 years.

OREGON IS STRONGER WHEN VICTIMS AND FAMILIES ARE SAFE:

- Public health: Safety from domestic violence would save Oregon more than \$35 million per year in health care costs.
- Public safety: Safety from domestic violence and sexual assault would reduce Oregon violent crimes.
- Child welfare: Safety from domestic violence would reduce 1/3 of child welfare cases in Oregon.
- Economic stability and development: Safety from domestic violence would save \$9.3 million in annual lost earnings, and prevent a leading cause of homelessness for women and children.

EVERYONE DESERVES TO BE SAFE AT HOME:

- Since 2009, more than 150 Oregonians (men, women, children) have died as a result of domestic violence.
- Victims and children must have a safe place to go when fleeing abuse.
- Oregon can save lives by protecting victim services.
