In SSP, only TANF benefits can help with housing



Monthly benefits to buy food (SNAP) Monthly cash grants to pay for basic daily necessities (TANF) Monthly subsidy payments to child care providers for working parents (ERDC)

"Participants also described housing programs as essential to finding stability. Many participants conveyed how TANF simply does not cover the cost of rent, which makes housing assistance a necessity."

Healthcare	7%	\$35.41
Misc.	32%	\$161.92
Total	100%	\$506

Housing impacts

On families:

When families are not safe and stable, addressing barriers to employment are not their top priorities

On DHS:

When cash assistance must be spent on housing, there is less money and opportunity for parents to prepare for, find and retain employment

Crisis to safety Safety to work ready to work that pays
