Oregon Revised Statute 410.435

- In 2005 the legislature amended law for Oregon Project Independence (OPI) to expand to cover adults 19-59 with physical disabilities.
 - However, the statute prohibited the adoption of rules around expansion, until the funding for OPI was "sufficient".





The OPI Pilot Project

Effective July 1, 2014, HB 5201 authorized funding and directed the Department of Human Services (DHS) to develop a pilot project to expand OPI service to people with disabilities younger than 60 years of age, through June 30, 2015.

Pilot participant demographics

- ✤73% are between the ages of 50 and 59;
- *77% live on a monthly income of less than \$1,500;
- *78% report having liquid assets of less than \$10,000 (\$15,000 for a couple);
- ✤75% live alone;
- 73% score moderate to high risk for an out of home placement;
- 30% report having a fall with injury in the past 6 months.

Assessed Service Priority Level

Consumers by Service Priority Level (SPL) 1=highest need, 18=lowest need





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Average cost per consumer

- Average Cost of personal and home care services for pilot consumers = \$335 per month.
- For higher needs individuals (SPL 3 or higher) = \$422 per month.
- For consumers with fewer needs (SPL 18) = \$276 per month.







Consumer profile stories

- Male, in his 50s
- Significant pain and mobility issues
- Income of \$922/month
- Difficulty maintaining his home or having any social interaction
- Assessed at Service Priority Level 17
- Now uses
 - Motorized scooter
 - In-home care of 25 hours per/month
- <u>Outcome</u>: Consumer plans to return to volunteering with a local charity to help others in need.

- Woman, 51 years old
- Income of \$771/month
- Homebound
- Recent history of falls
- Assessed at Service Priority Level 13
- No family in the area
- Now receives
 - Meals
 - Housekeeping
 - Personal care assistance
- <u>Outcome</u>: She no longer feels hopeless and alone.



Recommendation

- ORS 410.435(2) prohibits the Department from adopting rules making OPI age-neutral unless the we find that funding "*is sufficient to fund the expansion of the program to persons with physical disabilities.*"
- The Department believes that a biennial appropriation of at least \$27.5M will suffice to meet the criteria above. This amount assumes that:
 - Approx. \$21.5M will be used for the 60 and older population and;
 - Approx. \$6M will be used by individuals ages 19-59



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
