## Oregon Society of Physician Assistants supports the reauthorization of the rural health practitioner tax credit, SB 37 and HB 2125

The Oregon Society of Physician Assistants seeks to promote quality, cost effective, and accessible health care; to support the professional and personal development of Physician Assistants; and to advance the PA profession as well as the PA/MD team approach to health care.

With that in mind, OSPA supports Senate Bill 37 and House Bill 2125 as part of a broader program to support recruitment and retention of rural medical providers. As Oregon endeavors to increase access to quality health care at reduced costs, Physician Assistants are part of the primary care workforce to achieve the goals of the Triple Aim. SB 37 and HB 2125 will increase access to health care for Oregonians in rural and underserved populations.

The rural health practitioner tax credit provides an incentive to health care providers who serve patients in rural Oregon. Oregon's rural health care providers often are alone in providing health care in such a community, working overtime and on thin margins to serve patients. This tax credit encourages providers to serve in rural communities by offering some relief from financial burdens associated with their cost of doing business.
